

Awards are presented to the high-point boy and the high-point girl.*

*Through generous endowments to the Angus Foundation, Angus enthusiasts have created scholarships that, for years to come, will empower NJAA members to attend college and pursue studies in their respective career fields.*

*This year, the Angus Foundation awarded more than \$100,000 in scholarships at the 2008 NJAS Awards Ceremony, including 30 \$1,000 scholarships, 20 \$3,000 scholarships, two \$5,000 undergraduate scholarships, five \$5,000 graduate scholarships and numerous named scholarships.*

*The public speaking contest was designed to better equip junior members with the communication skills necessary to succeed in the industry and in life. Juniors prepare a speech in advance and are evaluated on content, presentation and knowledge of the subject revealed in a question-and-answer session. The winning speeches will be published throughout the coming year as part of "Next Generation."*















### EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING

The NJAA and American Angus Association Junior Activities Department co-sponsor the extemporaneous speaking contest, which is fast becoming one of the most competitive contests at the NJAS. Each participant receives a topic and reference information 30 minutes prior to his or her scheduled speaking time. Prize money is awarded in age divisions as follows: first, \$75; second, \$50; and third, \$25. The winner of the senior division receives a Harvey Rattey sculpture from the American Angus Auxiliary in the name of Richard L. Spader. The winners of the two intermediate divisions receive a Harvey Rattey pewter sculpture from the American Angus Auxiliary in the name of Pat Grote.

### PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST

Photos were entered in one of four categories: Angus cattle, landscape, people, and around the farm or ranch. Judges evaluated the entries prior to the NJAS on the basis of photo quality and creativity. Winning photos can be seen in the August Angus Journal beginning on page 286.

### CREATIVE WRITING

The creative writing competition allows NJAA members to express their thoughts through writing. Each age division has a different topic and word length requirement. 













## POSTER CONTEST

The poster contest, judged during the NJAS, is divided into three subject areas — breed or association promotion, membership recruitment, and herd advertisement. In each division and age category, the third-place winner receives \$10, the second-place winner receives \$20, and the first-place winner receives \$30.

## GRAPHIC DESIGN CONTEST

The purpose of the graphic design contest is threefold: 1) to display the creative talent of NJAA members; 2) to share ideas that may be useful in promotion of our breed, our organizations and our individual herds; and 3) to provide another fun, educational and competitive activity for interested juniors who may or may not be able to participate in other programs.

## QUIZ BOWL

There are two parts to the quiz bowl competition. The first round involves a written test. States may enter as many teams as they wish. The age classification for the team is determined by the oldest member of the team. Multiple-state teams may be entered; however, state teams must be filled before juniors may participate in a multi-state team. The eight high-scoring teams in each age division qualify for the verbal round, which consists of a single-elimination quiz bowl tournament. Each placing state junior Angus association will receive the following premiums: first, \$75; second, \$50; and third, \$25.









Contestants dress along with the theme to their skits and present their dishes to the judges. The Black Kettle Award, given in memory of Paul St. Blanc, is presented to the highest-placing team among all age groups.

## HERDSMANSHIP

The purpose of this competition is to encourage cooperation, fellowship and teamwork among state juniors in developing and maintaining a display of cattle and stall area. It also promotes pride and enthusiasm for state junior organizations and rewards those organizations that achieve this purpose. Divisions are based on the number of cattle exhibited by the states — 61 head or more, 46-60 head, 31-45 head, 16-30 head, and 15 or fewer head. Judging is based on cleanliness and general appearance of the aisle and bedding; appearance of the animals; appearance and organization of equipment and signs; youth tending the cattle; and promotion of state association, Angus or beef. Each placing state junior Angus association receives the following premiums: first, \$125; second, \$100; third, \$75; fourth, \$50; and fifth, \$25.

## SCRAPBOOK

The scrapbook contest is intended to encourage recordkeeping and provide a means to show others statewide activities and accomplishments during the past year. Any state or regional association may enter a scrapbook. They do not have to have cattle on display at the NJAS, so it provides an opportunity to compete for those who could not travel to the event.
