John Riffle, Pleasant Hill, Mo., was the recipient of an Honorary Alumni Award from the University of Missouri-Columbia (UMC) College of Agriculture, Food & Natural Resources during the 2008 Celebration of Excellence in Columbia, Mo.

The honorary alumni award is presented to people who are not former students or graduates of UMC but have taken an exemplary interest in the university's College of Agriculture through the years and deserve recognition.

A native of Pleasant Hill, Riffle joined the military four days before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor and retired from the U.S. Air Force as a colonel. He was an intelligence officer, advising President Truman regarding the situation in postwar Europe, and

received two Presidential Citations and the Air Force Commendation Medal. Truman personally autographed the back of Riffle's colonel's insignia with "HST."

Riffle also worked for the American Red Cross in Europe and directed public relations and sales for Williams Meat Co. in Kansas City, Mo., for 25 years. He serves on the Missouri State Fair Foundation Board and on the Missouri State Fair's Youth in Agriculture Committee. He and his wife, Jean, received the Missouri Department of Agriculture's 2002 Farm Family Award and were the Department of Agriculture 1996 Family of the Year.

Riffle was co-author of a 100-year history of the American Royal during its centennial celebration. He was active in 4-H as a youth and has continued his involvement with

the organization, receiving a 4-H Alumni Award. Riffle has been the recipient of an honorary FFA degree and is a life member of the American Angus Association. The Riffles raise Angus cattle on their farm, John Riffle Angus Farms, and operate a cattle marketing business.

Pasquotank Farms, Elizabeth City, N.C., has received the American Angus Association's Historic Herd Award. W.T. Jackson Jr. purchased his first purebred bull in 1954 from Springfield Farm, Rapidan, Va. Three years later he bought a group of registered cow-calf pairs from the Kinloch Farm dispersal sale in Supply, Va., which laid the foundation for the Jackson's Angus herd.

The farm's second Angus bull was also purchased from Kinloch Farm in 1957. W.T. joined the Association that same year. Ten years later Ike Jackson, W.T.'s son, began farming full-time with his dad. They utilized Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®), artificial insemination (AI) and embryo transfer (ET) to make genetic progress in the herd consisting entirely of registered Angus.

Until his death in 1999, W.T. remained active on the family farm. Today, Ike and his wife, Kathrine, manage 35 head of cows on the land that has been in their family since 1879.

The American Angus Association presents the Historic Angus Herd Award to Angus herds that have been in the continuous production of registered Angus cattle by the same family for 50 years or more. CONTINUED ON PAGE 54

Two Box Ranch, Toledo, Wash., has received the Historic Herd Award from the American Angus Association. The herd was established by Andrew Chopic in May 1948 when he purchased a bull and 20 cows from Harold Bowman, Roy, Wash. Nearly all of the registered Angus originated from a herd in Canada. Later that year he became a member of the Association.

Andrew's son, Frank, joined him a few years later, and together they built a herd of 135 females by the 1960s. They marketed cattle in the Pacific Northwest through consignment sales, bull tests and private treaty. In 1964, after Andrew's retirement and a short stay in southwest Washington, Frank moved the herd to the Nile Valley region in Naches where he and his wife, Grace, raised nearly 200 head of Angus. Three of their children were actively involved in 4-H, FFA and the junior Angus programs.

Colin, the youngest of their children, now manages the herd of 75 cows in Toledo. He and his wife, Millie, submit weights to AHIR and use ultrasound to make genetic progress with their herd, which has generated its own females for the past 60 years. A few of their cows have reached Pathfinder[®] status.

IN PASSING

Norma Conley, Groton, Conn., died May 18 at her home.

The daughter of Richard and Bertha (Crombie) Smyth, Norma was raised in Enfield, Conn. Norma, her parents and siblings were all closely involved with the family's dairy and tobacco farm operations, which existed in Enfield until the mid-1970s.

After completing high school in Enfield, Norma graduated from the University of Connecticut with a bachelor's degree in education. She used her love of mathematics in her subsequent work in jet engine design for United Aircraft Co. (now Pratt & Whitney).

She was married to William C. Conley in 1948, moved to Groton in 1950 and resumed her design career at General Electric Steam Turbine Division in Fitchburg, Mass. During her life in Groton, Norma raised four children and spent her years living with her family at Gibbet Hill Farm, a nationally recognized breeder of registered black Angus cattle.

Beloved by her family and friends for her wit, energy and humor, Norma was an avid reader and follower of financial markets. In 1983, she became a partner in the family's black Angus farm in Missouri, which is currently in operation and managed by two of her sons. In 1984, William C. was elected American Angus Association president and was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation in 1995.

Norma is survived by her husband of nearly 60 years; daughter Barbara; sons William J., Timothy and Richard; and eight grandchildren.

Lee McCoy, 60, Newnan, Ga., died May 22 at the Piedmont Fayette Hospital.

Born in McAlester, Okla., Lee grew up in Duncan, Okla. He attended Kansas State University and graduated from the Texas Christian University Ranch Management Program. Lee entered the U.S. Navy as a torpedo man on the USS Pomodon submarine in 1966. He later served as a fieldman for the Kansas Livestock Association and various other livestock publications.

In 1989, Lee entered the ag broadcasting field as assistant farm director for the Texas News Network. Lee continued to build an impressive broadcasting résumé, working for various radio stations, including the Arkansas Radio Network and Southeast AgNet Radio. He was voted Ag Communicator of the Year for Alabama in 1999 and Farm Broadcaster of the Year
