## **Angus Ambassador Named**

Sydni Lienemann, Princeton, Neb., was named Nov. 6 to represent more than 25,000 Angus breeders as the 2018 Angus Ambassador.

A freshman majoring in animal science and agricultural economics at the University of Nebraska–Lincoln (UNL), Lienemann competed against four other finalists for the title at the 2017 Angus Convention in Fort Worth, Texas.

The top candidates were invited to the 2017 Angus Convention for the final round of competition, which included an interview, as well as a five- to eight-minute presentation followed by five minutes of questions.

The finalists presented on a wide variety of topics. Lienemann presented on Angus GS<sup>™</sup>, Day focused on advocacy, Cassady spoke about sustainability, Scilacci covered production and profitability, and Klahr presented on Angus dollar value indexes (\$Values).

Funded by the Angus Foundation, the Angus Ambassador will represent the Angus breed at industry events throughout the United States and Canada, including a Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) Building Blocks seminar in Wooster, Ohio; the annual Cattle Industry Convention in Phoenix, Ariz.; the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) Annual Research Symposium & Convention; and the Guiding Outstanding Angus Leaders (GOAL) Conference in Canada.
