

Board Action

The following is a review of action taken during the meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Angus Association conducted Nov. 10, 2001.

Pursuant to notice, President Howard Hillman called the meeting of the American Angus Association Board of Directors to order in the King Room of the Executive West Hotel in Louisville, Ky. The following officers and directors were present: Howard Hillman, president; Leroy Baldwin, vice president; Steve Brooks, treasurer; Keith Arntzen; Jim Bradford; Minnie Lou Bradley; John Curtin; Ben Eggers; Joe Elliott; Jot Hartley; Paul Hill; Brian McCulloh; Cecil McCurry; Lowell Minert; Abbie Nelson; and Dave Smith. Leo Baker was present throughout the meeting by telephone.

Director of Finance Richard Wilson presented the 2001 year-end financial audited report that was reviewed in detail by the Board.

Wilson also reviewed the October 2001 financial reports, as submitted, for the Board.

The Board approved a recommendation by the Activities Committee that a change be added to the wording of Rule 6 of the National Showmanship Contest rules to read:

To be eligible, each contestant and alternate must presently own registered Angus.

The mailing list policy was reviewed by the Board, and it was their consensus that the policy remain as amended and approved in September 2001.

Staff members presented a progress report regarding the concept of recording ancestral information and performing multibreed evaluation for Angus-influenced cattle. The consensus of the Board was that this concept should remain a priority item for continued research and study.

Bidding was hot for the Angus history book sold during a one-time auction at the 2001 American Angus Association Annual Banquet, Nov. 12, in Louisville, Ky. Auctioneer Ray Sims, Raymore, Mo., took the final bid of \$10,000 for the signed No. 1 copy of *A Historic Angus Journey* — *The American Angus Association, 1883-2000.*

Ten buyers purchased the book, then donated it to the Association, which in turn presented the book to the family of Richard L. Spader.
