Attendees at the 2017 Angus Convention in Fort Worth, Texas, had the opportunity to utilize their livestock judging skills during a competition Nov. 5 within the live cattle demonstration area of the trade show. The judging contest drew 128 total contestants and at least as many spectators.

Participants placed four classes of Angus cattle — two sets of breeding heifers and two sets of yearling bulls. Selection scenarios were given for two of the classes, and questions were asked on one set of performance bulls.

The contest was divided into three age divisions: youth (13 and under), young adult (age 14-21) and adult (22 and older). The winner in each age division was awarded a custom-made Beaver 20 hat — valued at \$650 each — donated by Greeley Hat Works.

Colter Pohlman, Hereford, Texas, took home top honors in the youth division. Fellow Texan Cooper Dube of Thorndale placed first in the young adult category. Jeff Nemecek, Iola, Kan., placed first in the adult division and was also named the overall winner

with the highest score.
