NWSS Angus Bull Sale

The 2020 National Western Angus Bull Sale will be Thursday, Jan. 16, 2020, at 1:30 p.m. in the Beef Palace Arena during the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo. All consignments will be genomic tested; possess a complete set of expected EPDs and dollar value indexes (\$Values); and must be free of any genetic conditions recognized by the American Angus Association.

All bulls born before Jan. 1, 2019, must have passed a complete breeding soundness examination (sometimes referred to as a BSE), both physical and semen, within 30 days of the sale.

Important dates for Pathfinder

Launched in 1978, the Pathfinder® Angus Program identifies superior females in the breed based on performance records submitted through Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®). To qualify, cows must be actively enrolled in AHIR, producing her first calf near the herd's average age for first calving. Second, her first three calves must post a minimum average weaning weight

ratio of 105 in a contemporary group with a minimum of five herd mates of the same sex. Lastly, calves must be sired by a registered Angus bull.

All data on females must be received by the end of the business day on Jan. 31, 2020, to be eligible for 2020 Pathfinder status. Official Pathfinder status will be announced on Feb. 6, 2020.

MaternalPlus incentives

A whole-herd reporting initiative, MaternalPlus®, began at the Association in 2012 with the aim to increase the suite of cow productivity selection tools available to Angus members and their commercial customers. Members already submitting 100% of their weaning weights each year, heifer breeding records and dam disposal codes, should consider signing up for MaternalPlus whole-herd reporting and reap additional benefits.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).
