North American International Livestock Exposition title; Nov. 17

Kansas State University (K-State) received the North American International Livestock Exposition title Nov. 17. This marks the 15th national championship for K-State's livestock judging program but the first since 1998.

The team was made up of Madison Andrade, San Juan Bautista, Calif.; Daniel Dobbs, Carnesville, Ga.; Cagney Effling, Highmore, S.D.; Lane Egger, Columbus, Neb.; Sam Gleason, Maple Hill, Kan.; Chisum Grund, Sharon Springs, Kan.; Trace Mulligan, Scott City, Kan.; Skyler Scotten, Nevada, Mo.; Justin Slabaugh, Goshen, Ind.; and Austin Vieselmeyer, Amherst, Colo. Scotten and Dobbs placed second and third, respectively. Grund and Vieselmeyer were sixth and eighth, respectively. Vieselmeyer was also named an All-American.

Bronze and Silver Awards

Jordyn Wickard, Greenfield, Ind.; has earned the National Junior Angus Association's (NJAA) Bronze and Silver awards, according to Jaclyn Upperman, education and events director of the American Angus Association in Saint Joseph, Mo.

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the NJAA Recognition Program that began in 1972. Junior Angus breeders must apply for the awards, then meet point requirements in many areas of participation before receiving the honors. Applicants are evaluated in areas of junior Angus association activities and leadership; participation in showmanship, contests and shows; using performance testing to improve their herd; and their progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.

Greenfield, Ind., native **Jordyn Wickard** has earned the Bronze and Silver awards. The 17-year-old daughter of Chris and Julie Wickard currently attends Eastern Hancock High School.

Wickard is a member of the NJAA and the Indiana Junior Angus Association (IJAA), where she currently serves as first vice president. She has served as secretary, communications director and royalty for the IJAA, and regional director for the Southeastern Indiana Angus Association.

A member of the American Angus Auxiliary and an avid showman, Wickard is no stranger to the Angus industry. She has competed in the public speaking, career development, extemporaneous speaking, creative writing and skill-a-thon contests and the Auxiliary-sponsored All-American *Certified Angus Beef*^{*} Cook-Off at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS).

In addition to serving as a voting delegate and working with the mentoring program at the NJAS, Wickard has also participated in the Raising the Bar conference.
