The website features information about upcoming shows and deadlines, as well as specific information about the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) and all the related contests.

Conferences such as Raising the Bar and Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) are a great way to travel the country and meet other young Angus enthusiasts. All of the registrations, hotel and travel accommodations are listed on the website. These are amazing experiences where juniors get to experience agriculture in ways they may have never seen before.

The Awards tab is another fantastic tool for juniors. Bronze and Silver awards are a way for junior breeders to be recognized for their achievements. The Gold

Award is given during the junior's last year of eligibility, and all of the guidelines are found on the webpage. Some of the scholarships have specific criteria and different applications, so start early in your planning and application process.

For older junior members, the Internship tab is a must-watch. Here internships and job opportunities are listed from some of the leading companies in the ag industry, looking for motivated young adults in the Angus breed for future and immediate jobs.

Bronze and Silver Awards

Sam Greiman, Perry, Iowa, has earned the National Junior Angus Association's (NJAA) Bronze and Silver awards, according to Caitlyn Brandt, events and education director of the American Angus Association in Saint Joseph, Mo. Lila Sims, McEwen, Tenn., has earned the NJAA's Silver award; and Lena Sims and Lona Sims, both of McEwen, Tenn., have earned the NJAA's Bronze award.

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the NJAA Recognition Program that began in 1972. Junior Angus breeders must apply for the awards, then meet point requirements in many areas of participation before receiving the honors. Applicants are evaluated in areas of junior Angus association activities and leadership, participation in showmanship, contests and shows, using performance testing to improve their herd, and their progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.

Sam Greiman is the 17-yearold son of Kurt and Tina Greiman. The Perry, Iowa, local attends Dallas Center-Grimes High School.

As an active member of the NJAA and the lowa Junior Angus Association, Greiman has shown at the local, state and national level. He has participated in the livestock judging contest at the NJAS and the LEAD conference.

Greiman has submitted weight data to the Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®).

McEwen, Tenn., is home to **Lila Sims**, the 16-year-old daughter of Robby Sims. In addition to the NJAA, the McEwen High School student has served the Tennessee Junior Angus Association (TJAA) as royalty.

Sims has shown at the local, state, regional and national level, including the NJAS. At the national show, she also participated in the livestock judging and quiz bowl contests.

Sims has consigned cattle to the West Tennessee Angus Sale.
