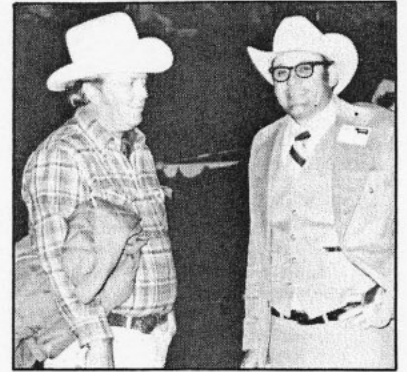

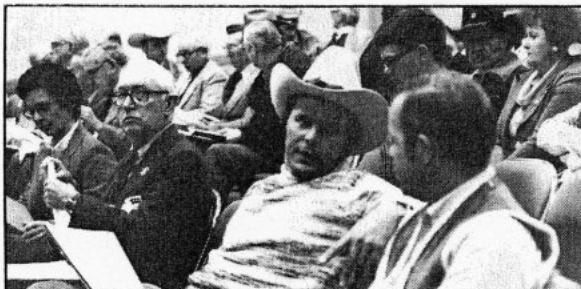

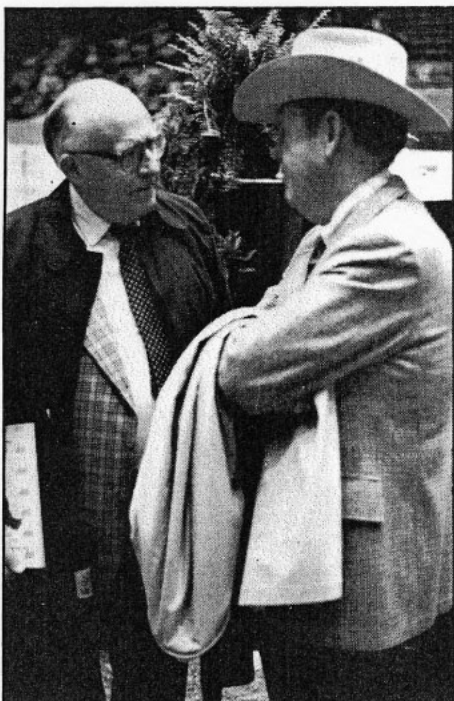

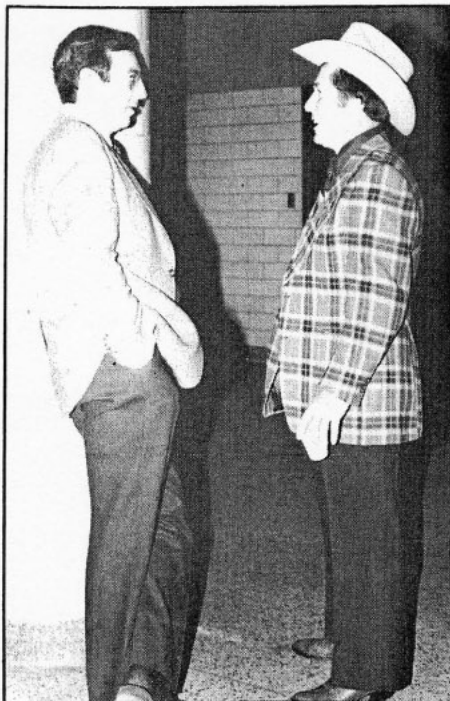

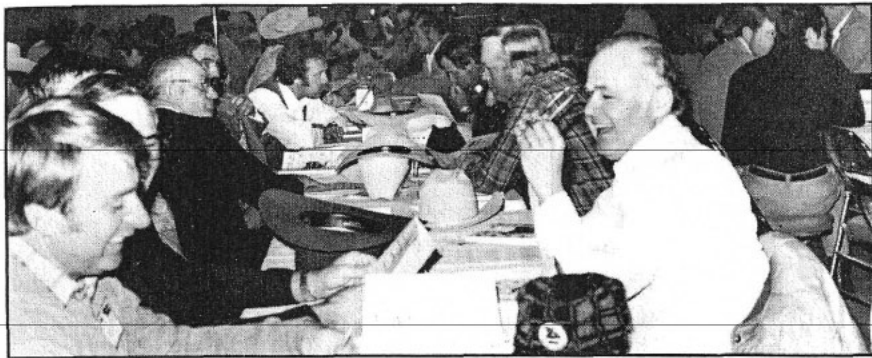

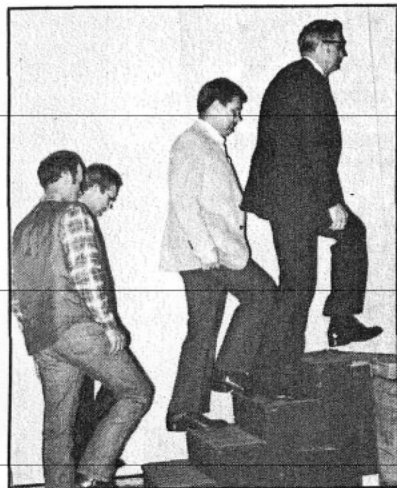

The 97th annual meeting of the American Angus Assn. held Nov. 17 in Louisville was attended by 279 elected delegates (or their alternates) as well as nearly 100 other interested persons.

Myron Woolever, Unionville, Mo., stepped up to the association presidency on a unanimous ballot, taking over from Dave Pingrey, Benton, Miss. 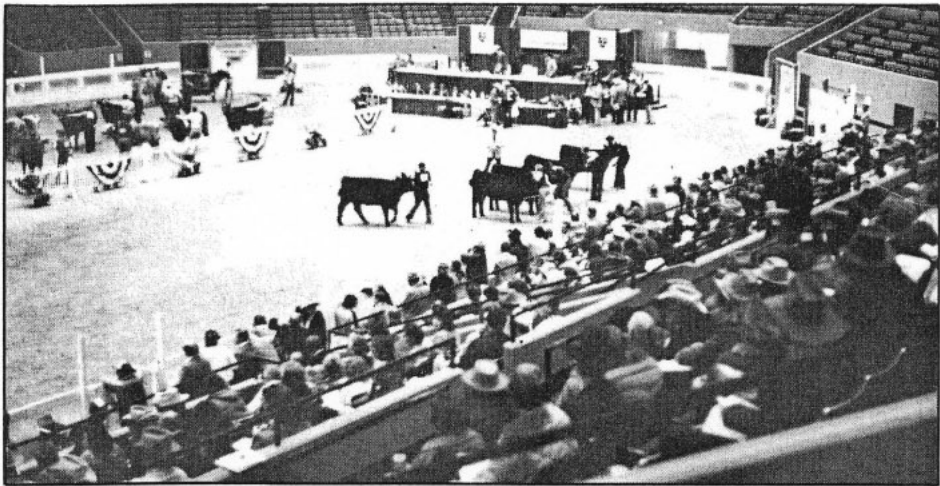
The National Show

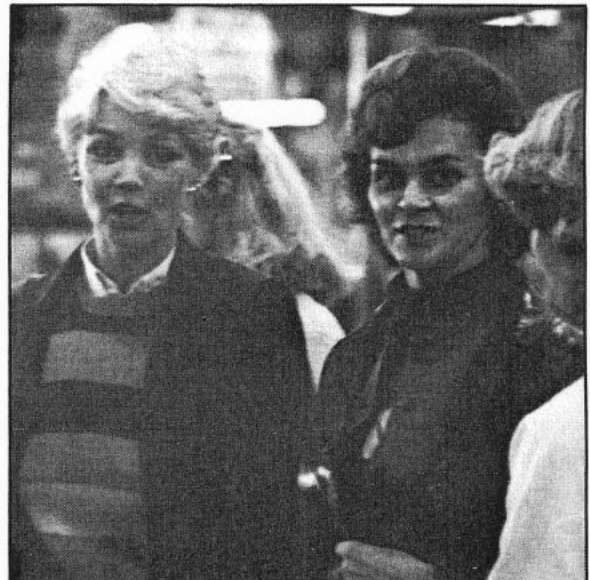

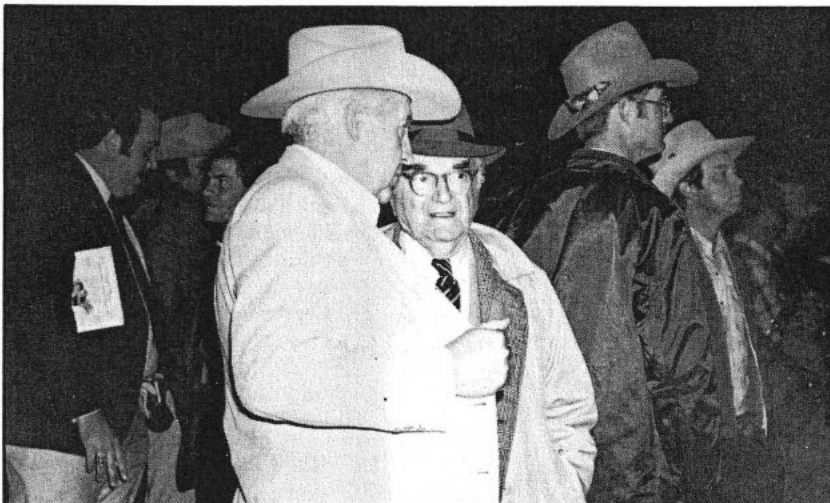

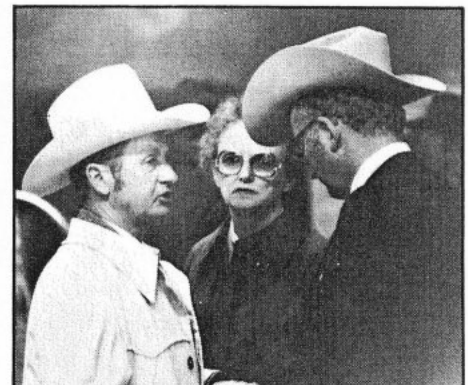
