Montana Rancher Elected President At Association Annual Meeting

K eith Stevenson, a Montana rancher and Angus breeder, is the new president of the American Angus Association, the nation's largest beef cattle registry organization.

Stevenson was elected November 16 at the 109th Annual Meeting of the American Angus Association in Louisville, Ky. The meeting, at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center, was held in conjunction with the North American International Livestock Exposition.

Elected vice president of the American Angus Association by the 224 Angus voting delegates was Paul "Butch" Meier of Jackson, Mo. The delegates also elected three new members to the American Angus Association Board of Directors. They are Jack Baker, Butler, Mo.; Charles "Bud" Smith, Russell Springs, Ky.; and Neil Marshall, M.D., Longview, Texas.

Two members of the Board of Directors were re-elected to a second three-year term. They are Tom Perrier, Eureka, Kan., and Bill Wilson, Cloverdale, Ind.

Stevenson and his family operate Stevenson Angus Ranch in the Judith River Basin near Hobson, Mont. He is a graduate of Montana State University with dual B.S. degrees in agricultural production and agricultural education, and was a member of his college livestock and meats judging teams. He taught agriculture briefly before joining the family Angus operation.

An early participant in the Montana Beef Performance Association program, the Stevenson Angus Ranch herd is now totally enrolled in the American Angus Association's Angus Herd Improvement Records program. Although he has sold cattle and semen to many foreign countries and throughout the United States, his primary business is supplying bulls to the commercial cattle industry.

Stevenson was active in both 4-H and FFA as a youngster and was a contestant in the first National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest. As an adult he has been an advisor to local FFA and 4H organizations, and has been active in state and local Angus activities, having served two terms as president of the Montana Angus Association He was elected to the Board of Directors of the American Angus Association in 1988 and served in 1992 as vice president. He is active in church and community activities and he and his wife, Roberta, have four sons, Darrell, Mike, Bob and Billy Jake.

Paul "Butch" Meier, the new American Angus Association vice president from Jackson, Mo., has just completed serving two terms of three years each on the American Angus Association Board of Directors.

Meier grew up on a grain and livestock farm in southeast Missouri and became involved with Angus cattle as a 4H club member. He graduated from the University of Missouri in 1970 with a degree in animal science. He later studied at the University of Georgia, Athens, where he coached the livestock judging team.

After college he returned to the family farm which produces pasture, row crops and registered Angus cattle. He has been active in state Angus activities and served as president of the Missouri Angus Association in 1983. He and his wife, Eileen, have two sons, Brian and Greg.

Jack Baker, a newly elected member of the American Angus Association Board of Directors, has been breeding registered Angus cattle for some 40 years. He was a founding director of the Missouri Beef Improvement Association and served as its president in 1983-84.

Smith was active in both 4-H and FFA as a youngster, and was named FFA Chapter Star Farmer. He joined the family operation after he graduated from high school, then later managed the Russell County Livestock Market for 10 years.

Smith, his wife, Pamela, and his four children, Angela, Henry, Bryan and Carla, background cattle and raise hay, corn and tobacco on their farm plus the registered Angus herd. He has served as advisor to the Kentucky Junior Angus Association and is a past president of the Kentucky Angus Association.

Neil Marshall operates Clear Creek Angus Farm near Longview, Texas. He is a graduate of Baylor University, and earned his Doctorate of Medicine from the University of Texas in 1957. He has served as president of the Gregg County Medical Society and is chief of staff of the 350-bed hospital in Longview.

Marshall's registered Angus operation was started in 1963. The herd has long been enrolled in the AHIR program. He
