He was a member of the Washington State Angus Association for 45 years. Waldher assisted in starting the Washington State Junior Angus Association and was active with the junior Angus show days and events.

Waldher was a member of Holy Rosary Catholic Church and the Knights of Columbus; was a city councilman for eight years; president of the local Kiwanis Club; and was a past member of the Pomeroy Chamber of Commerce.

He is survived by his wife; three sons: Mark and James, both of Pomeroy, and Chris of Longview, Wash.; two daughters: Lisa Lund of Pomeroy and Susan of Fruitland, Idaho; eight grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a brother, Donald.
