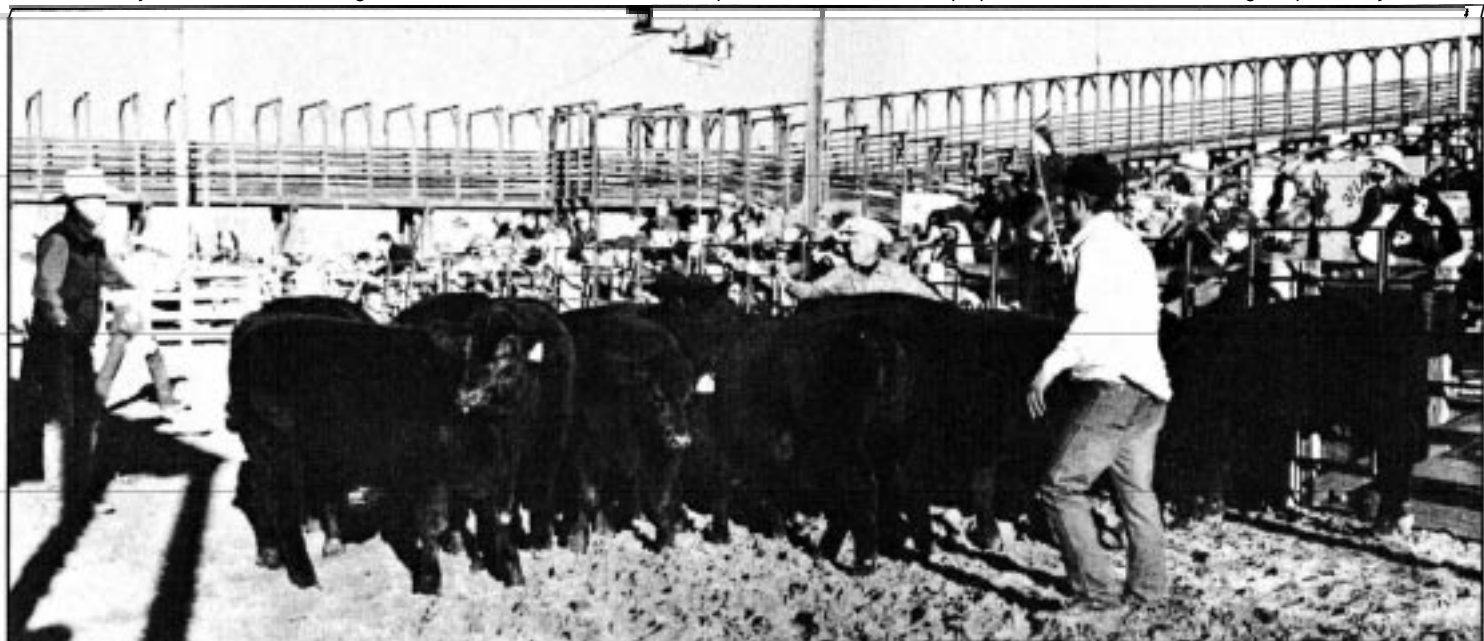

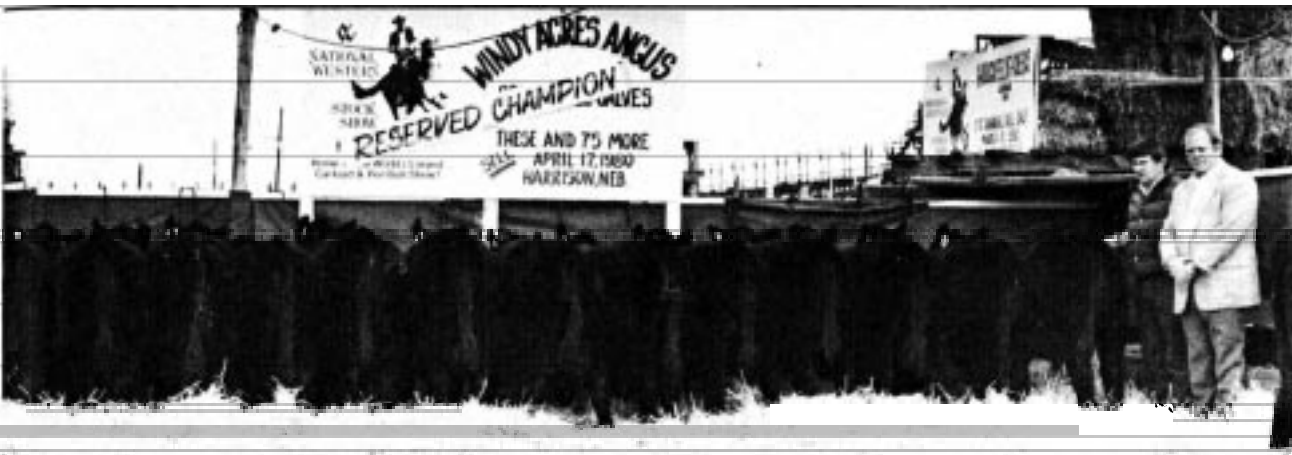

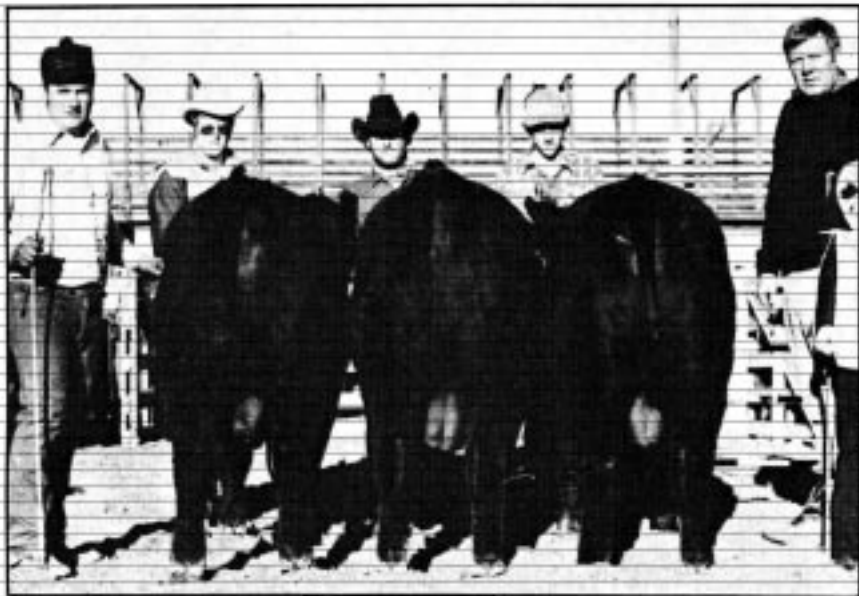
Manager Ed Winters and Mr. Angus made their mark in the yards Sunday afternoon when the carload from Ken-Cay1 Ranch, Littleton, clinched the championship. Most of the junior bull calves in the 15-head load were sired by last year's Denver grand champion Ken Caryl Mr. Angus 8017, and several were by his sire Northern Prospector 1125. Ken-Cay1 and Winters, no strangers to the winner's circle in carload competition, have claimed the purple banner several times during the past few years.

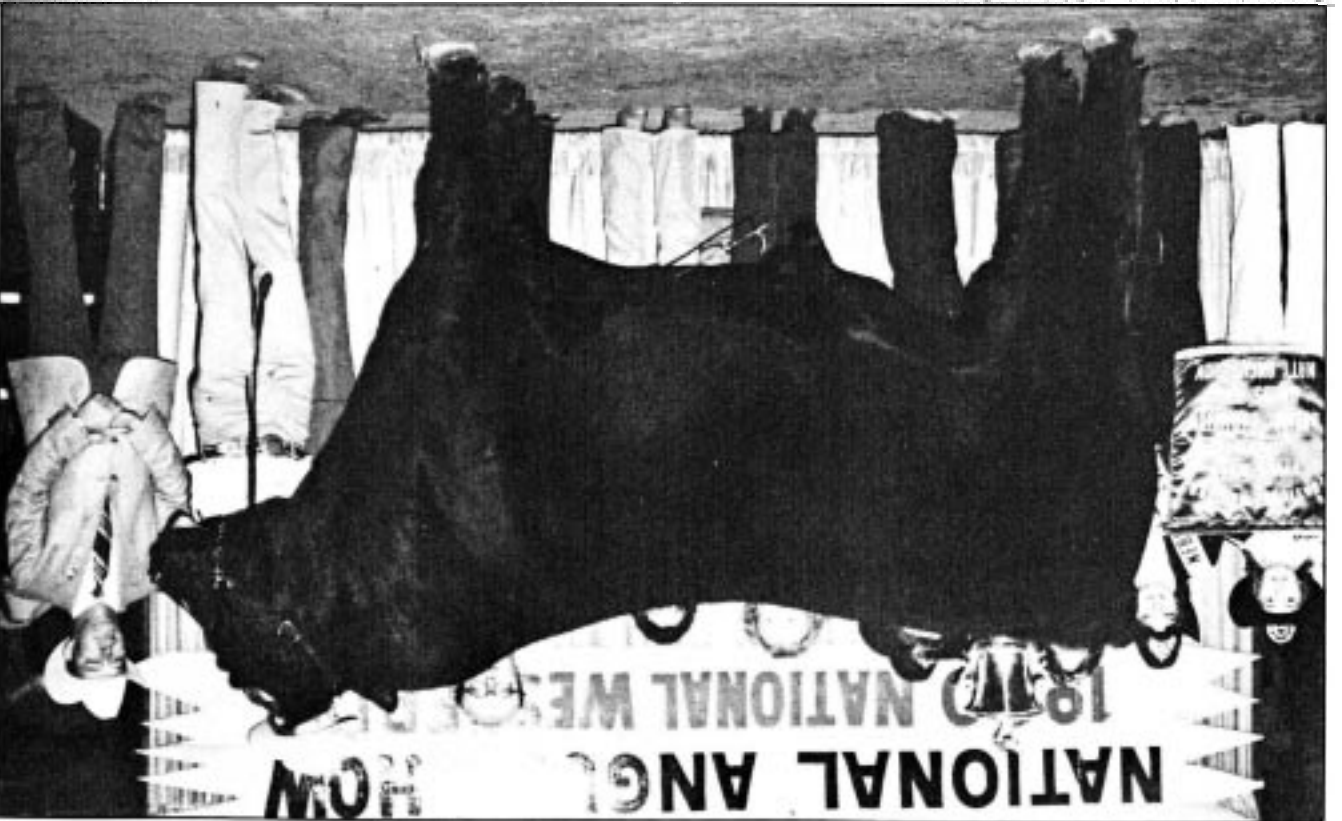


In the mid-week feederpen show, the champion pen of Angus steers (pictured above) was shown by Hyland Angus Ranch, Ree Heights, S.D. The calves averaged 594 lb. and sold at an \$845 average. Reserve Angus pen from Uhrig Ranch, Hemmingford, Neb., averaged 728 lb. and \$1,375. The grand and reserve grand feeder pens were Angus crossbreeds from Box Bar Ranch, Eddyville, Neb. The top pen averaged 651 lb. and \$2,780, while the reserve pen averaged 565 lb. and \$1,730.

## National Sparks 1980 Angus Explosion

More than 3,000 spectators were on hand in Denver Jan. 14-15 for the 1980 National Angus Show held in conjunction with the 74th National Western Stock Show. Nearly 300 entries turned out for the strong show, and one of the largest crowds in Angus history quickly filled the stands and gathered at ringside as George Ellis of Beartooth Ranch, Columbus, Mont., judged a display of some of the top Angus cattle in the country.

The first day of competition marked the naming of champion females. Sayre Patriots Lena, grand champion heifer of the American Angus Breeders' Futurity in Louisville last summer, claimed grand champion title once again as Ellis shook the hand of exhibitor Mark Richardson, manager of Mr. & Mrs. Sayre MacLeod's Sayre Farms, Phelps, N.Y. The big, framey, May 6, 1978, heifer is a daughter of Sayre Patriot.

For reserve grand, Ellis went to junior

champion female Premier Blackbird 317S, an April 18, 1978, daughter of Premier Stardom entered by Premier Angus, Inc., Cloverdale, Ind., R.H. Holcomb Jr., Ruxton, Md., and Blugrass Angus Farm, Danville, KY.

The second day of showing found another enthusiastic crowd, and a feeling of tension mounted among the spectators. Ankonian Sentry, owned by Quirk Land & Cattle Co. and Werner Equipment, Inc., both of Hastings, Neb., worked his way to the top of the bull division by defeating some of the most popular sires the Angus breed has ever seen in competition. Sentry, the 2,287-lb. senior champion bull, is an April 14, 1977, son of Tail N Emulous 541.

Filling reserve grand champion bull position was Ken Caryl Mr. Angus 8017, grand champion of last year's National Western Stock Show. A May 2, 1977, son of Northern Prospector 1125, this reserve senior champion weighing 2,265 lb. was exhibited by Ken-Caryl Ranch, Littleton, and Angus

International, North Platte, Neb.

WAF Zaramere 905, named reserve junior heifer calf champion of the North American international in Louisville last November, stepped up to junior calf championship in Denver. This March 1, 1979, daughter of Eileenmere Masterpeice JAO was exhibited by Weaver Angus Farm, Peoria, Ill. Claiming reserve junior calf honors was Clyde Nelson, Salmon, Idaho, with Nelson Betty Lue 9030. This Feb. 2, 1979, daughter of Nelson Breakthru had been grand champion of the 96-head Northern International open show in Billings, Mont.

The senior calf championships were claimed by the same heifers who won at the North American International. The calf champion belonged to Laura Hart, Adair, Ill. Her entry, Double HH Erica 8530, is a Nov. 6, 1978, daughter of Ankonian Applause. Reserve senior calf honors went to Jeffrey Johnson, Summitville, Ohio, on Summitcrest Irene K388, a Sept. 20, 1978, daughter of Sayre Patriot.

E&W Enchantress G21, intermediate and reserve grand champion of the 1979 North American, stood as reserve intermediate champion in Denver behind grand champion Sayre Patriots Lena. The reserve entry owned by Stacia Ellis, Greentown, Ind., is a July 2, 1978, daughter of Dakota Poundmaker 375.

Lisa Bohlen, Howell, Mich., and Premier Beef Cattle, Fowlerville, Mich., exhibited reserve junior champion female Schearbrook Blackbird 160X, a March 5, 1978, daughter of Schearbrook Shoshone. She stood reserve to the junior and reserve grand champion Premier Blackbird 317S.

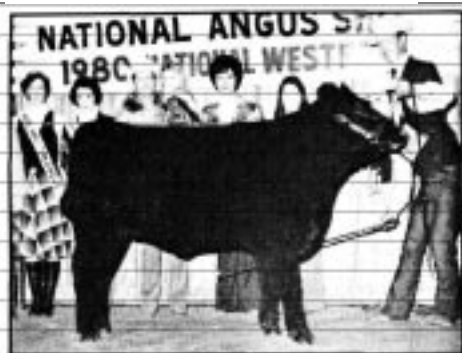

Ken Caryl Ironsides 0489, the highest selling bull at public auction in 1979, took junior calf champion honors. The 990-lb. entry of Buck and Barbara Stevens, Point Reyes, Calif., and Ken-Caryl Ranch is a Jan. 3, 1979, son of reserve grand champion Ken Caryl Mr. Angus 8017. Winning reserve junior calf championship was Thomas Cactus, a 967-lb. Jan. 11, 1979, son of Mon Reposa Chaparral who stood second in class to Ironsides.

R&J Ranch, Briggs, Texas, and Treasure Cove Farms, Leawood, Kan., claimed senior calf champion title with R&J Commander 658, reserve grand champion bull of the 1979 American Royal. Weighing 1,358 lb., he is a Sept. 22, 1978, son of Premier Jackpot. Reserve senior bull calf was Tree Lane Superior 36, a 1,424-lb. Sept. 6, 1978, son of Byergos Black Revolution 36. Entered by Tree Lane Farms, El Paso, Ill., the calf earlier had claimed senior calf champion title of the North American in Louisville.

Intermediate champion bull was Sir Wms Warrant, grand champion of the 1979 American Royal and Western National Angus Futurity in Reno. This 1,750-lb. son of Wetonka 2446 is a May 7, 1978, entry of Quirk Land & Cattle Co., Bert Jobe of Littleton and Ken-Caryl Ranch. Dr. James J. Hicks of Briarhill Angus Farm, Union Springs, Ala., chalked up two championships by first winning reserve intermediate bull title with Briarhill Jay, a May 11, 1978, son of Briarhill JJ. This 1,742-lb. intermediate champion of the North American was a joint entry with three Illinois firms—L.B. Pierce & Sons, Inc., Creston; Picket Fence Farm, Grayslake; and Lincoln Land Angus Farm, Fisher.

Dr. Hicks' second entry, General JJ Patton, also a son of Briarhill JJ, won junior champion bull honors. The General, a joint entry with New Melleray Corp., Dubuque, Iowa, and R&J Ranch, is a March 10, 1978, bull weighing 1,800 lb. Robert Zeedyk of New Carlisle, Ind., and Nancy Schwabender, Wauwatosa, Wis., took reserve junior champion spot with Craft Lucky Strike. The March 2, 1978, son of Thomas Chaps entered the ring at 1,878 lb.

In group competition, first place in the get-of-sire class was won by progeny of Byergos Black Revolution 36 entered by Forrest Byergo, Barnard, Mo.; Way-View Farms, Inc., Hebron, Ohio; Stampede Cattle Station, Ltd., Edmonton, Alta.; Tree Lane Farms, El Paso, Ill.; Summitcrest Farms, Summitville, Ohio; and Buckeye Angus Breeders, Coldwater, Ohio. Weaver Angus Farm led out progeny of Eileenmere

Named "Herdsman of the Year" was Randy Graham of Quirk Land & Cattle Co. Graham was honored at the Herdsman's Banquet Jan. 11 at the Beef Palace on the National Western grounds. Both award and banquet were sponsored by the American Angus Assn. Graham and his wife Melissa, who works with him on the show cattle, will complete their first year with Quirk in February. Prior to the National Western, they were working on 60 head, though Graham says 20 animals is the usual number in the show barn. A native of Gilman, Iowa, Graham was employed by Sydenstricker Angus Farms, Mexico, Mo., before moving to Nebraska.

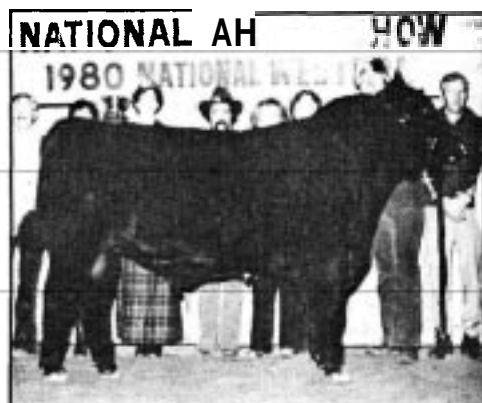

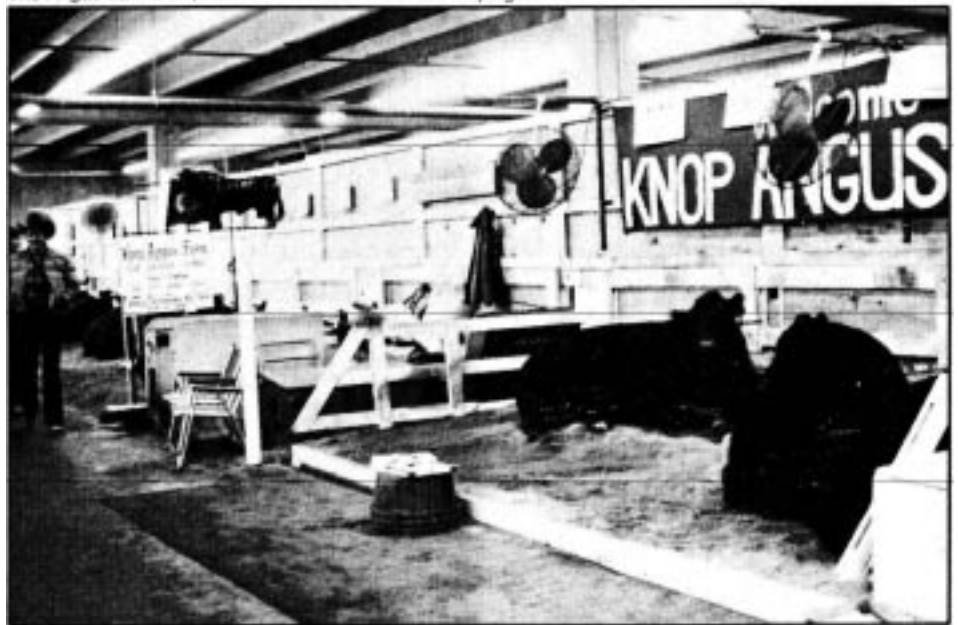

Grand champion steer selection interrupted the judging of Angus females Jan. 14 in the National Western coliseum when judges George Stratheam, Mariposa, Calif., and Frank Sewald, Golden, faced the tough decision. As they studied the all-black championship line-up, Stratheam commented that Angus and Herefords were undoubtedly proving to be the backbone of the beef cattle industry.

Charlie, a 1,231-1b. Angus-Chianina cross owned by Joel Kampen, Humboldt, Iowa, was slapped on the rump for grand champion honors before a capacity crowd. This champion of the medium heavyweight division brought \$11 per lb. in the auction Tuesday night, Jan. 15. Purchased by Nick and Penny Kane of Nicky's Restaurant, Estes Park, the total price was \$13,541.

The remaining champions and reserve champions then stepped up for their chance at reserve grand. After careful consideration, Stratheam and Sewald turned to the lightweight division champion Bar None, a Limousin-Angus-Hereford cross exhibited by Fred Orr, Golden. Buying the steer at \$7 per lb. was L.C. Fulenwider Jr., representing Box Elder Farms Co. of Denver. Nineteen-year-old Orr said he would donate 25% of the purchase price, an estimated \$7,819, to the Colorado Boys Ranch.

This was 13-year-old Kampen's first time ever to exhibit at the National Western, while reserve winner Orr has been showing steers in Denver for the past nine years.

Sitz Angus Ranch, Harrison, Mont., won the bid on intermediate champion Foote Acres Supreme from the consignment of



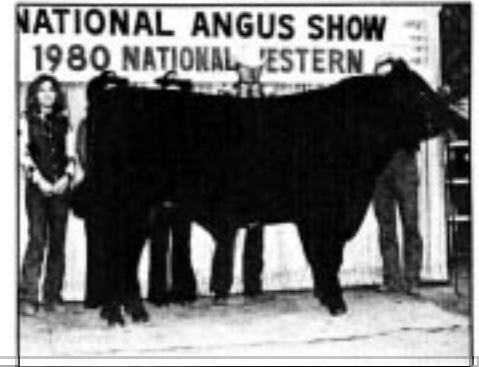

### Demand Exceeds Supply in Foundation Female Auction
