t was there again—like every year. The excitement in Denver can become an addiction. Early last month, 196 tougher-than-ever Angus lined up on the hill for the Association's 1985 National Angus Show and left nothing unsaid in proclaiming the rapid success of advancement in the breed. The new crop of junior calves were bigger and more fantastic than ever, numbering 102—over half of the total entries!

Mark Richardson, Afton, Okla., took on the elite ranks of the "hill cattle" and offered his expertise as he placed calves in their debut and many returning veterans. Exhibitors gave him a group of exciting animals to choose from and, in the end, winners included many new names (especially among the bulls), and many familiar champions.

And the enthusiasts were there. From alley to alley, stadium seat to backdrop, it was truly "people-deep." They filled the sale arena and clamored to make the National Western Sale reach new heights.

If they weren't on the hill, folks were in the yards watching a 124-head show of pens and carloads. Not one step down from last year, 17 exhibitors paraded 16 pens and eight carloads of unbeatable sets of bulls through the auction arena.

Denver spelled excitement. It always does. And the people who made it exciting were the exhibitors, spectators and all-around Angus enthusiasts. Congratulations to all who participated!



alled "Tiara" for short, this 5-4-83 daughter of Dr Spock is out of Windac Class 1752 ("Windy"). Beginning her star-studded show ring performance last vear at Denver, she gained an early lead by winning junior calf champion. But then she had quite an act to follow since her sire and dam were both named champions at the 1982 North American and "Windy" went on to complete her show career as a triple crown winner. "Tiara" did well, standing as reserve champion at the 1984 Futurity and grand at the North American. putting her just short of her own triple crown title. Besides winning the silver at Denver this year, an embryo out of her sold for \$13,500 in the National Western Sale. (Half of the flush which yielded "Tiara" sold through the 1983 National Western Angus Sale, earning \$60,000; full-sibling Harrison was also a result of that valuable mating.)

he favorite of Montana and the Northwest, HAR Bang 1774 had his own cheering section behind him the whole way. This impressive son of last year's triple crown winner QLC Winchester stood first among the toughest and biggest set of bulls ever to hit that age bracket (the now-famous class 17), then collected junior and grand champion titles. A 1-21-83 son out of Harmon Black Lady 1210 and bred by his own prefix, Harmon Angus Ranch, he tipped the scales at 1,956 lb, minutes before show time. This popular champion began a new flight in his career when two-thirds interest sold in the December 1983 Harmon Angus Ranch sale for \$177,000 to a distinguished group entitled The Gang U.S.A. He won his class at the 1984 Denver show and captured grand championships at the NILE and the Yellowstone Exhibition.







Close on the heels of "Tiara," this Texas sweetheart wasn't going to give up easily. Marching right in behind the intermediate champion ("Tiara"), "Sybil" (reserve intermediate) outranked Princess Jamie 1R and the youngsters to take the reserve grand championship. She had worked on her titles earlier in the year winning the 1984 Futurity and her owners will now focus on a future of production. An embryo out of "Sybil" was auctioned off for \$10,000 at the National Western Sale; she will be flushed three times before carrying a natural calf.









RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION PEN OF THREE BULLS



Worthington expressed his thanks and appreciation to Quirk and to his fellow herdsmen for this award.


