Recognizing volunteers

I would like to take this opportunity to tell you a little bit about Cathy Watkins, chairwoman of the Janet Castle Crystal Award.

In 1988, when the Auxiliary decided to initiate the Crystal Award, the search began for someone to be in charge of it. Earlier that year, at the NJAS in Indianapolis, Ind., Cathy was the state representative in charge of all the educational events for that show.

The Auxiliary members noted Cathy's enthusiasm and attention to detail. So, she was asked to become the chairwoman of the Crystal Award committee.

She took on this responsibility in the same manner she had approached her duties at the NJAS. She developed and proposed guidelines and scoring criteria. She selected the prestigious trophies that are awarded to the winners and solicited the help of the American Angus Association to develop a computer program to tally the scores. Cathy's initiative was instrumental in making the Crystal Award successful.

Although Cathy didn't grow up with Angus cattle, she was on the meats and livestock judging teams at Michigan State University. Team member Bob Watkins caught her eye, and she soon discovered that in order for their relationship to last she would have to love the man and his Angus cattle. They have been together for 31 years.

Cathy and Bob have no children, yet she is present at many junior Angus events. She has served as a leader for the Indiana Junior Angus Association and strongly believes in the positive life lessons young people learn from having Angus projects. These include not only the showring, but also the educational contests, the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) Conference, and the achievement programs that are available to juniors. Cathy says that not having children of her own has allowed her to be a cheerleader, coach and supporter for all juniors.

Cathy serves as secretary of the Indiana Angus Association, a position she has held for five years.
