Delegate nomination forms

Preparations are being made for the American Angus Association's 2019 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Reno, Nev. Forms to nominate delegates to the annual meeting will be mailed to every active life and regular member of the Association who qualifies as an eligible voting member prior to April 5, according to the Bylaws.

The nomination period is April 8-June 7. Each eligible voting member is allowed to nominate one eligible voting member who resides in the same state or district, including himself or herself. The candidate should be highly involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Signed nomination forms must be received in the Association office by mail or online submission no later than 4:30 p.m. CDT on June 7, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to all eligible voting members in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the form, please return it promptly.

PAP research EPD

The American Angus Association and Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI) released a research expected progeny difference (EPD) for high altitude pulmonary arterial pressure (PAP) on Feb. 1.

The PAP EPD predicts the genetic differences in PAP score with lower scoring animals being more acceptable. PAP is an indicator for animals with lower risk of developing high altitude disease (HAD), which in most cases results in congestive right heart failure.

This latest EPD from AGI is a first of its kind for any breed association and will help producers identify cattle less susceptible to HAD.

Raising the Bar conference

This year, the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) will be in the Little Apple March 21-24, 2019, for Raising the Bar.

The conference, funded by the Angus Foundation, is designed to build stronger leaders and create lasting friendships while exploring secondary education options. Participants will also tour farms and ranches in the area and other Manhattan attractions.

Registration deadline is March 1. No parents or state advisors will be allowed to attend.

Phenotype and Genotype Show

The Phenotype and Genotype Show (PGS) will be hosted in conjunction with both the 2019 Western Regional Junior Angus Show (WRJAS) in Reno, Nev., and Eastern Regional Junior Angus Show (ERJAS) in Timonium, Md.

This show creates another avenue for junior members to show their heifers in an additional competition while providing an educational opportunity to learn about the value of expected progeny differences (EPDs) as part of the process in selecting seedstock.

Animals entered in the PGS will be evaluated by a judge under a system that requires both genotypes and phenotypes to be considered. The results will be a composite score where the genotype (EPD) placings and phenotype placings will be equally weighted at 50%. For more information, visit *www.angus.org/njaa*.

Entry and ownership deadline for WRJAS is March 1 and the ERJAS, entry and ownership deadline is May 1.

Show for the Purple

The 2019 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) will take place July 14-20 in Louisville, Ky.

More than 1,200 head of cattle are expected to compete in the show ring at this year's NJAS themed "Win, Place, Show for the Purple."

The classes offered will provide opportunities for juniors to exhibit their owned heifers, bred-and-owned (B&O) heifers, cow-calf pairs, steers, and B&O bulls.

Nominate individuals

Any state junior Angus association can nominate its advisor(s) to be honored as the NJAA Advisor(s) of the Year. The award is presented at the NJAS and recognizes the time, effort and dedication nominated adult volunteers give to their state junior Angus association.

Individuals can also nominate Angus enthusiasts for the Honorary Angus Foundation. This award is also presented during the NJAS and recognizes those who have made extraordinary contributions to junior Angus programs.

Nomination forms are available by contacting the Events and Education Department at 816-383-5100. Nominations for both honors are due by March 1.

Herds of the century

The Century Award recognizes members who have been in continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 100 years or more.

Award recipients are recognized with an engraved plaque at the Association's Annual Awards Banquet, notice in the *Angus Journal*, and a list maintained on the Association's website.

Foundation scholarships

The Angus Foundation will award a number of undergraduate and graduate scholarships this year. Scholarship recipients will be recognized at the 2019 NJAS in Louisville, Ky.

The eligibility requirements for the general Angus Foundation scholarships remain the same. Angus youth who are graduating from high school or in college currently may also be eligible for other Angus-related scholarships that are permanently endowed and managed by the Angus Foundation.

The Foundation will make available graduate student scholarships to young men and women actively involved in the Angus breed who are pursuing advanced degrees.

Applicants must have at one time been a NJAA member and must

currently be a junior, regular or life member of the Association. Strong preference and priority will be given to applicants pursuing advanced degrees related to the beef industry.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).

conjunction with numbers when permanently identifying animals. For example, G001 and G002 could designate the first two calves born into your herd in the year 2019.

Using the international letter code is optional for Angus breeders.

Transfer assistance

If you know of a junior member who has purchased or raised a heifer that he or she wants to show, please make note of all ownership deadlines. If a deadline is approaching and you haven't received the transferred registration, the Association can help.

Contact the Association at least two weeks prior to the show ownership deadline. Every effort will be made to get the transfer processed in time. Remember, late transfers are never accepted, regardless of the reason or circumstances.
