Les Reel held true to his words, "Don't worry; it will be all right," after by-pass surgery in April 2000. The owner of Reel Livestock Center, Congerville, Ill., is once again soothing the worries of the many friends he has developed in the industry.

Dec. 16, Reel suffered an aorta dissection. After eight hours of surgery, he was placed in intensive care at Saint Joseph's Hospital in Bloomington, Ill. He suffered a slight stroke on the right side and lost his left leg above the knee due to excessive swelling. He will need extensive rehabilitation to learn to walk again, but at press time he was scheduled to be headed home to Congerville.

Friends have organized a May 26 benefit for Reel at the Livestock Center in Congerville. The day's activities begin at 11 a.m. and will include a magic show, an Elvis impersonator, a petting zoo, a raffle, a pork-chop and ribeye dinner and a benefit auction (sale-item donations are being accepted). Reel got his start in the cattle business in 1948, purchasing two \$350 Angus heifers with the help of his uncle, Carl Eglin. By 1957 he had progressed to exhibiting the reserve champion Angus steer at the International in Chicago. He won the International grand champion steer twice.

Reel's first job was with the Harvey Harter herd at Carlock, Ill., where he says he learned the reward that could be attained from breeding great Angus cattle.

Reel always has loved cattle and the people involved with them. Feeling there was a need for a clean, well-managed facility to market the animals, he dreamed of providing a competitive marketplace in which farm families could sell their products. In 1965 he created, not a sale barn, but a Livestock Center. He surrounded himself with some of the best farmers and farm families in the area to help him manage the facility.

In 1974 Reel and his brother John built a sale barn north of Congerville. The facility was intended for their own sales, but so many people liked the "Northtown Unit" and the fitting service offered that they wanted to use it for their own calf sales, dispersals and production sales, as well as other breed sales and events.

Paul Pippert, 75, of Overland Park, Kan., passed away Sept. 14. He was born July 3, 1925, in Talbert, Calif. He grew up in Mason City, Iowa, and attended Mason City Junior College and Tarkio Presbyterian College, Tarkio, Mo. He married Wava Withers on Jan. 21, 1951.

He started his broadcasting career in Watertown, S.D., at KWAT. He was an Army veteran. After serving his country, he resumed his radio career in Mason City. Later, he moved to Shenandoah, Iowa, and worked at radio station KMA. He then moved to the Kansas City area in 1954 and started with KCMO, where he was employed for 25 years and served as farm director.

He continued his broadcasting career at KFRM in Wichita, Kan., then moved to

WIBW in Topeka, Kan., where he worked for 10 years, retiring in 1990.

Former president of the MO-KAN chapter of the National Agri-Marketing Association (NAMA) and of the Livestock Booster Club, he served on the executive committee of the Kansas City FFA Advisory Council. He also was a member of the Agri Business Advisory Council of the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce and served on the board of directors of the Agricultural Hall of Fame and on the board of governors of the American Royal Association.

In addition to his leadership positions, Pippert was honored with various awards throughout his career, including an Oscar in Agricultural Radio in 1978.

Survivors include his wife of 49 years; a daughter, Paulette Cott, and son-in-law, Greg, Winston Salem, N.C.; two grandsons; two brothers, Wesley, Washington, D.C., and Harold, Mason City, Iowa; and 19 nieces and nephews.

He was president of the Gering Industrial Foundation and was a Nebraska highway commissioner. He served on the Regional West Medical Center Hospital board of directors, was a member of the Wyobraska Council Boy Scouts of America, University of Nebraska College of Agriculture Advisory Board, president of the Scottsbluff-Gering United Way and a member of the Nebraska Diplomats.
