

Conrad Grove, 80, Downingtown, Pa., passed away Jan. 28 due to complications from Lou Gehrig's disease.

Born in Waynesboro, Va., Grove moved to Chester County, Pa., in 1959 to direct the development of the Soleil Farms Angus herd. The herd was owned by Mabel (Pew) Myrin, the daughter of Sun Oil Co. founder Joseph Pew. After Myrin's death in 1972, the farms and cattle were donated to the Devereaux Foundation, and Grove was retained as manager for another dozen years until the herd was sold.

In recent years, Grove was a consultant for Sinclair Cattle Co. in Warfordsburg, Pa., and he frequently traveled to ranches across the country and to Scotland, where the Angus breed originated.

Grove was a U.S. Army veteran of World War II, and he received a Bronze Star for action in the European campaign. In November 2001, he was inducted into the American Angus Association Heritage Foundation. Also that year, the Pennsylvania Angus Association voted to present an annual award in his name to an outstanding farm (or family) who has made the most positive contribution to the breed.

Grove was a leader of the Chester County 4-H Club for more than 40 years. He took particular joy in advising the young members about how to properly care for farm animals.

He is survived by a son, Conrad Jr. His wife, Nancy (Perry) Grove, preceded him in death in 1994 after 46 years of marriage.

Lyle Springer, 78, of Denton, Texas, passed away Feb. 17 after a long battle with cancer.

Springer was born Feb. 26, 1923, in Lansing, Mich., to Raymond and Grace Springer. He was the youngest of three sons. He graduated from Everett High School and Michigan State University, both in Lansing. In high school, he was valedictorian of his class, and at the university, he won numerous awards for national livestock judging.

After completing basic training at Camp Davis, N.C., at the age of 19, Springer served in the U.S. Army in the European theater in World War II. He soon climbed the ranks to captain. He commanded various anti-aircraft

automatic weapon units in Africa and Italy as well as maintenance of ground motor units. He was awarded the Medal of Victory.

On Feb. 1, 1946, Springer married Martha "Marty" Armitage of Lansing. In 1949, they moved to Princeton, Ill., where he was employed by Cornbelt Farm Dailies (*Drovers*) and served as a fieldman.

In 1951, he became the administrative assistant to Frank Richards, who was the secretary (now known as executive vice president) at the American Angus Association. In 1958, Springer became director of what is now known as the Performance Programs Department. He held various executive positions in the organization, and he also directed the first foreign market development program. In 1977, the family moved to Aurora, Colo., where he was employed by the Ankony Shadow Isle Genetics Center.

In 1979, he was selected to become the executive vice president of the Red Angus Association in Denton, Texas. He retired in 1988.

After two months of retirement, Springer went on to pursue a career in real estate and eventually became a real estate agent/broker. He chaired the president, vice president, treasurer and various other committees of
