

Let failure teach us all



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Heifer to benefit 2005 NJAS

Angus enthusiasts from the western United States are already making plans for the 2005 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), scheduled for July 17-23 in Denver, Colo. Thousands of youth and adults from across the country will attend the weeklong event that has grown to be the largest single-breed beef cattle show in the world.

In an effort to continue fund-raising for the event, Silveira Bros., Mendota, Calif., has donated a heifer to sell at the 2004 Western National Angus Futurity (WNAF), Sunday, April 25 in Reno, Nev. Darrell Silveira, and Rick, Allison and Garrett Blanchard have donated Silveira's Reba Pride 3438, an October 2003 daughter of G Bar Wulff's EXT 9306. All proceeds from the sale of the heifer will go to the 2005 NJAS.

"The Angus breeders in the Western states are excited to have this heifer donation to go toward hosting the 2005 NJAS," says Abbie Nelson, fund-raising committee member from Wilton, Calif. "Selling this heifer in Reno is just one way our breeders can pull together to plan a successful event for the future leaders of the Angus breed."

Other items included in the heifer package are: breeding services using any Silveira Bros. program herd sire; an embryo flush and transfer from Larry Lanzon, Lander Vet Clinic, Turlock, Calif.; a 30-day insurance policy from Jim Bessler of American Live Stock Insurance Co., Geneva, Ill.; and transportation from Reno, Nev., to the buyer's ranch, courtesy of Randy and Peggy Lathrop of Lathrop Trucking, Dundee, Ill. pairs, as well as owned heifers, cow-calf pairs and steers. Youth also have the opportunity to enter steers in a carcass contest.

Judges for the cattle show include Brian McCulloh, Viroqua, Wis., who will evaluate the owned females; Mark McClintock, Fort McKavitt, Texas, who will judge bred-andowned females and bulls and cow-calf pairs; and Jim Gillooly, Washington, Ind., who will select champions in the steer show.

In addition to the cattle shows, educational contests for youth ages 9 to 21 will include: prepared and extemporaneous speaking, team sales, quiz bowl, photography, poster, graphic design and creative writing. The American Angus Auxiliary will sponsor the All-American Certified Angus Beef® Cook-Off. Six members will be elected to the NJAA Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the NJAA during the week.

More than 50 contestants will compete in the 38th Annual National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest. The contest is limited to two participants from each state. Showmanship judges include Alan Miller, LeRoy, Ill.; Sharee Sankey, Council Grove, Kan.; and Robert Alden, Hamilton, Mo.

Exhibitors and contestants at the NJAS must be junior members of the American Angus Association, and must be 9 years old, but not yet 21, by Jan. 1, 2004. Applications for transfer of the animal to junior members must be postmarked by May 15. Applications for registration of bred-and-owned animals and all entries must be postmarked by June 1.
