Angus Arrivals

In Passing

Carl Michael Wallman, 75, Pittsfield, N.H., passed away Feb. 14.



He was an environmentalist, ecologist, farmer, breeder of championship cattle, apostle of naturalist philosopher Aldo

Leopold, lifelong fan of the New York Yankees, good neighbor and dear friend. He was proprietor of Graylag Cabins on Wild Goose Pond and cofounder of the Northwood Area Land Management Collaborative (NALMC), which began in 2004 as a means by which neighbors working together could be good stewards of the land.

After graduating from the

University of Wisconsin and studying mathematics at Northeastern University, Carl bought 180 acres in Northwood, and he eventually learned the basics of farming and raising Angus cattle.

During the next 25 years, he turned Harmony Hill Farm into a great success. Carl developed innovative breeding techniques that had cattle ranchers from around the country studying his methods and buying his cattle. In 1989 he was awarded the grand champion pen of three Angus bulls at the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver.

In 1994 he sold his herd and purchased the main house and lakeside cabin of Graylag, a property on Wild Goose Pond in Pittsfield that had been a basketball camp in the 1960s and 1970s. Inspired by the natural landscape and the philosophy of Aldo Leopold, he became determined to reach out to neighbors and build community, to think of the land as part of a larger system that knows no boundaries.

He worked with New Hampshire Fish and Game to understand and map the watersheds and habitats, and he began a dialogue with neighbors about their common interests, across property lines and often across ideological lines, too. That's how NALMC was born in 2006.

After restoring some of the cabins and adding artistic touches throughout the property, Carl began renting cabins. Gradually, Graylag grew and evolved as a place of healing and beauty.

In his final months, Carl succeeded in establishing paths for both Harmony Hill Farm and Graylag to continue in their current form well beyond his lifetime. The farm is being donated to Southeast Land Trust under an innovative easement, so that it will remain a farm forever. And his beloved Graylag has been reborn as Graylag Nature Preserve, a nonprofit dedicated to connecting people with nature and one another.

Carl is survived by his sons Evan and Gabriel; one granddaughter; and partner, Fran.

Gordon Glen Booth, 81, Veteran, Wyo., passed away Feb. 26.

Gordon was born Nov. 5, 1938, in Torrington, Wyo., to Henry and Helen Booth. He was the oldest of three children. He grew up in Veteran and graduated from Veteran High School Eagles in 1956.

He attended college at the University of Wyoming with majors in agriculture and animal science, as well as running track. While at the University of Wyoming, Gordon belonged to the TKE fraternity. It was also at UW he met Mary Ann Zwemer and on June 23, 1958, they married in the Deaver Methodist Church. They went back to UW that fall before moving to his family's farm in Veteran, Wyo., where they were married for 58 years.

Gordon served as past president of the Wyoming Angus Association, an original founding charter member of the Wyoming Beef Cattle Improvement Association, and past president of the Goshen County Farm Bureau. He was a 4-H leader and Boy Scout leader, as well as receiving the honor as an Eagle Scout.

He belonged to the American Angus Association, American International Charolais Association, American Quarter Horse and Paint Horse Association. He also raised and belonged to Columbia and Rambouillet Sheep Breeders' Association.

Gordon began to artificially inseminate (Al) cattle in 1969. He was a cutting-edge and original user of prostaglandin for synchronization. He worked with Jim Drayson on sexed semen as early as 1985. He began embryo transplanting (ET) in the early '90s. He loved working with American Breeders Association (ABS), where he has been a rep since April 1, 1986; over 35 years.

The ranch started Progress Thru Performance bull sales in 1973 at Stockman Livestock. He transferred the bull sale in 1979 to the home place. The ranch's sale was the first production sale in Goshen County with guest consignors. Gordon truly embraced technology of the genetic

influence and identity of cattle.

Gordon is survived by his children Kerri, Shawn, Jodie and Kacey; eight grandchildren; and eight greatgrandchildren.

In Recognition Historic Angus Herd

Ralph Porter and Sons, Dalhart, Texas, was recognized as an American Angus Association Historic Angus Herd.

In 1960, Ralph Porter, along with his son Wayne, purchased their foundation Angus herd from the OK&T Angus Sale in Buffalo, Okla. From this, a partnership was formed known as Ralph Porter and Sons.

At the time, the cows were sold as single units, pens of two or pens of three, and the average price was \$250. They purchased eight cows and one bull from Ralph Hopkins, Moreland, Okla.; Otto Yauk, Woodward, Okla.; A&M Hissen, Sand Springs, Okla.; L.B. Parsons and Sons, Anthony, Kan.; and C.T. Ubank, Coats, Kan.

In the beginning the blueprint of the cattle program was to keep all the females and sell the bull calves. The goal was to have 200 mama cows. That changed in 1964 when they purchased Scotch bull Blazon of SL 38 from J.V. Hampton of Fort Worth, Texas. The bull was purchased on the recommendation of Dallam County Extension Agent B.F. Yeates. This bull and his son were used for the next eight years to intensify the Scotch breeding.

The Historic Angus Herd Award recognizes Angus breeders and immediate families who have been in continuous production of registered-Angus cattle for 50 years or more.

The express purpose of the donation is to help fund the purchase of the historic Livestock Exchange Building located in the Yards at the NWSS complex. The board also voted unanimously to make a contribution to the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) conference, which is being hosted in Colorado in 2020.
