A Tribute to Frank Baker

rank H. Baker, 69-year-old animal scientist and senior advisor at Winrock International, died February 15 at Baptist Medical Center in Little Rock, Ark. His memory and contributions to the livestock industry, however, live on.

Baker was a son, student, soldier, husband, father, Extension agent, instructor, teacher, professor, scholar, researcher, leader, organizer, college dean, motivator, innovator, negotiator, diplomat, author, foreign ambassador and above all, a dear friend.

Born May 2, 1923 in Stroud, Okla., to Dewitt and Maude Hamon Baker. Baker became an animal science educator. He served on faculties at Oklahoma State University, University of Nebraska, University of Kentucky and Kansas State University. He also was an Army veteran of World War II, serving as a paratrooper and earning the Purple Heart.

His best known work at Winrock International, located at Morrilton, Ark., was the Heifer Project International.

For the above characteristics and contributions, a portrait of Baker hangs in the Saddle & Sirloin gallery in Louisville, Ky.
