The 2001 National Junior Angus Show will be July 9-14 in Denver, Colo.

unior Angus members from all corners of he United States are making plans for the 2001 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS). The annual event, which has become the biggest week of Angus activities during the year, will take place July 9-14 in Denver, Colo.

Junior Angus associations from several Western states have been planning and organizing this year's event, themed "Under the Western Sky," for more than two years.

Angus enthusiasts from more than 30 states are expected to enter cattle in the show, which has grown into the largest single-breed beef

cattle show in the world. Judges for the cattle show include Jack Ward, Lagrange, Ind., who will evaluate the owned females; Eldon Krebs, Gordon, Neb., who will judge the bred-and-owned females and bulls and the cow-calf pairs; and Randy Perry, Clovis, Calif., who will select champions in the steer show.

More than 50 contestants will vie for the coveted title of "Top Showman" during the finals of the 35th National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest conducted during the week. Showmanship judges include Tim Fitzgerald, Alderson, W.Va.; Andra Campbell, Klamath Falls, Ore.; and Brian Barragree, Absarokee, Mont.

In addition to the show and showmanship competition, National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members will participate in educational contests and leadership opportunities. Competitions include a public speaking contest, featuring both extemporaneous



and prepared divisions; team sales; poster; photography; and graphic design. The American Angus Auxiliary once again will sponsor the All-American *Certified Angus Beef®* Cook-Off Contest. See "How to Get Involved" on page 106 for more information about the many competitions.

During the NJAS, the NJAA will conduct its annual meeting, and six members will be elected to serve as national directors.

In addition to the week of activities, the Angus Foundation is conducting its first-ever golf tournament on July 10. The morning-long event

will begin at 6:30 a.m. at the Thorncreek Golf Course. See "Angus Foundation Tees Up" below.

To compete in the week's activities, exhibitors and contestants must be junior members of the American Angus Association and must have been 9 years old, but not yet 21, on Jan. 1, 2001. Applications for transfer of the animal to junior members must be postmarked by May 15, 2001. Applications for registration of bredand-owned animals and all entries must be postmarked by June 1, 2001.

Don't forget your golf clubs while packing the trailer for this year's National Junior Angus Show (NJAS). The Angus Foundation is excited to offer the first-ever Angus Foundation Golf Tournament on Tuesday, July 10, in conjunction with the NJAS.

The tournament will be at the Thorncreek Golf Course, one of Colorado's top 10 courses, in Thornton, Colo. The day's activities begin with a continental breakfast at 6:30 a.m., followed by a shotgun start at 7:30 a.m.
