Nominate delegates

Preparations are being made for the American Angus Association's 2021 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Fort Worth, Texas. Forms to nominate delegates to the annual meeting were mailed to every active life and regular member of the Association who qualified as an eligible voting member prior to April 9, according to the Bylaws.

The nomination period is April 12-June 11. Each eligible voting member is allowed to nominate one eligible voting member who resides in the same state or district, including himself or herself.

The candidate should be highly involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and

able to represent Angus breeders.

Signed nomination forms must be received in the Association office by mail or online submission no later than 4:30 p.m. CDT June 11, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to all eligible voting members in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the form, please return it promptly.

Candidate résumés

Association members seeking election to the Board of Directors of the American Angus Association may send a short biography, along with a photo, to Editor Julie Mais by Aug. 1. Biographies and photos submitted by the deadline will be published in the October *Angus Journal*, prior to the election at the Annual Meeting in November.

Biographies should be approximately 500-700 words and will be shortened if necessary.

Angus surpasses 20 million registrations

The American Angus Association, headquarters of the largest beef breed association, processed its 20 millionth registration March 17, 2021.

Over the 138-year history, the Association has averaged 135,135 registrations per year, topping the charts at 406,310 registrations in 1968. In fiscal year 2020, the Association registered a total of 305,531 head, up 954 from the previous year. "This is truly an exciting day for the American Angus Association and our members as we cross the 20 million milestone for registrations," says Jerry Cassady, director of member services. "To think that it took 96 years for our Association to reach the 10 million mark back in 1979, we've added another 10 million registered Angus into our registry in less than half the time. This is a credit to the hard work and efforts of our members."

Registration numbers signify the data behind the animal, tracing its lineage and potential to change the direction of cow herds. Using registered Angus bulls also unlocks additional premiums for every segment of the beef industry.

"It's pretty amazing to consider the amount of work and dedication that has been invested by our members over the years to get to this point," says Mark McCully, CEO. "Breeders of registered Angus cattle have stayed committed to the value of pedigreed seedstock and enjoy tremendous demand and market share today because of it."

Inventory Reporting AHIR data

The second enrollment period for the new Inventory Reporting AHIR® (Angus Herd Improvement Records) option is now open. Members who want to enroll their herds during fall enrollment, the deadline is July 15. Current herd inventory can be established within your AAA Login account.

The fee is \$2 for each female enrolled. This fee covers the AHIR

reporting cost for the next calf crop. Annual requirements for each female enrolled in the program include reporting a calf (birth date, sex, dam information), a reason for no calf, or a disposal code if the cow left the herd.

All members enrolled in the Inventory Reporting option will have the opportunity to earn the MaternalPlus[®] designation. For more information call 816-383-5100 or email angus@angus.org.

Breeding records needed

With spring breeding season upon us, remember submitting breeding records will help with the Association's ongoing cow fertility research. Submitting breeding records helps to support research for fertility haplotype validation and build on heifer pregnancy (HP) expected progeny differences (EPDs) to further expand the Association's toolkit surrounding fertility.

Please collect and submit cow ID, service sire and breeding date for each service under the Submit Data tab > AHIR Performance > Yearling Heifer or Cow Breeding Data. A downloadable spreadsheet is available under the Submit Data tab > Spreadsheet Entry > Breeding/ Cow Data.

Announcement of results of member disciplinary hearing

Pursuant to Bylaw Article VIII, Section 8.4, President David Dal Porto convened a properly noticed hearing Tuesday, March 30, 2021, regarding possible misconduct by member Chris Terembes, Executive Ranch, consisting of false submissions of data to the AHIR program on 89 calves reportedly born between 2016 and 2020 and false registration of 27 of those calves, when such calves did not in fact exist, in violation of Bylaw Section 8.1 and the 600-series rules of the American Angus Association.

Terembes attended and was represented by counsel at the hearing. Following the presentation and consideration of evidence, including documents and examination and cross-examination of witnesses, the Board of Directors, by a vote of 16-0, found Terembes guilty of the misconduct charged.

The Board further determined by a vote of 15-1 to impose the following discipline on Terembes: (1) expulsion from membership in the American Angus Association; (2) prohibition on acting as an agent on the membership account of any member of the American Angus Association; and (3) prohibition on submitting AHIR data.

All data submitted to the American Angus Association by Terembes from Jan. 1, 2016, forward has been removed from the Association's genetic evaluation. The fictitious animals have been removed from the Association registry. Subject to the Association's Rules, members in good standing may continue to register progeny of any animal solely or jointly owned by Terembes.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC Carrier of more than one genetic condition. XA – Affected of more than one genetic
- condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).
