
Art Auction To Benefit Beeferendum

An art sale to benefit the Beeferendum will be a highlight of the 1979 National Angus Outlook Conference, set for July 1-2-3 in Fort Collins, Colorado, said Dr. C. K. Allen, executive vice-president of the American Angus Association.

Cattlemen who attend the Conference will have an opportunity to bid on five limited edition, signed and numbered, reproductions of a new Frank Murphy oil painting that will be featured on the cover of the July Angus Journal.

The Frank Murphy painting and number 1 of the signed prints will be unveiled on Sunday evening, July1 at a gala Quarter-Century of Angus History art show on the Colorado State University Campus. The one-man show will feature the work of noted American Angus Association artist Frank Murphy, who will be at the event.

The auction of the first five prints, with all the money to go to support the Beeferendum, will be Tuesday Afternoon.

Frank Murphy is one of America's top livestock artists. He has done all the artwork for the American Angus Association since the early 1950's. This includes 15 oil paintings, many of which will be on display at the show, plus drawings for all of the Angus Association print advertisements until the 1970's when the national program was changed to feature actual animal photographs. Many of the original sketches and finished drawings for the Angus ads will also be on display at the art show.

Over the years the American Angus Association has produced framing prints of some of Murphy's paintings including the historical painting that was featured on the 1973 postage stamp and the famous Angus calf and butterfly painting. Many of these prints are now collectors items, as they are no longer in print. The Association still has a quantity of some of the prints including the historical painting, In-

Theme of the 1979 National Angus Outlook Conference is "Planning For Profit". The two-day program will be designed to help cattlemen increase their efficiency in the areas of cattle production, reproduction and merchandising. It is being billed by the Association as the "Angus Event of 1979".
