June 1 is the deadline for submitting performance records to the American Angus Assocation that can affect bulls listed in the fall *Sire Evaluation Report*. Plan now to attend National Conference

Plans are being finalized for the 1999 National Angus Conference and tour in Amarillo, Texas. Registration materials will be mailed next month to active members and to nonmember bull buyers in Texas and surrounding states, or they can be requested by contacting Linda Campbell at the Association.

The tour, set for Sept. 8-9, is co-sponsored by the Greater West Texas Angus Association and the Texas Angus Association. This two-day showcase of the Texas Panhandle will take participants from commercial and purebred cow-calf producers to marketing the end product.

The first day, which is Wednesday, Sept. 8, will include stops at JA Cattle Co., Claude; B3R Country Meats, Childress; and Abraham Ranch, Canadian.

Thursday, Sept. 9, the group will travel to Hales Angus Farm, Canyon; Lust-Dodd Angus, Lazbuddie; Olson Cattle Co., Hereford; Randall County Feeders, Canyon; the Palo Duro Canyon and the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum, Canyon.

The conference, which is titled "Angus in the New Millennium," will offer something for both purebred and commercial producers.

A highlight of the conference will be the keynote address by Tom Field of Colorado State University. Other speakers will include representatives from purebred and commercial operations, packing and value-added product development, as well as an update from the Certified Angus Beef (CAB) Program Supply Development Team.

Even though registration materials for the conference and tour aren't available yet, please feel free to reserve your hotel room. Headquarters will be the Radisson Inn, Amarillo Airport. Room cost is \$62 plus tax for one or two people, and reservations can be made by calling (806) 373-3303.

All competitive events, except the Cook-Off, will be held at the Tulsa State Fairgrounds.

May 15 deadlines for juniors

The ownership deadline for the NJAS is May 15. That's the date when all animals must be transferred into the individual junior exhibitor's name. The entry deadline for the show is June 1. No late transfers or entries will be accepted for any reason.

The entry deadline for the Eastern Regional Junior Angus Show in Clemson, S.C.; the North Central Regional Angus Preview Show in Springfield, Ill.; and the Northwest Regional Angus Preview Show in Kennewick, Wash., is May 15. Entries must be postmarked by the post office on or before this date.

May 15 is also the deadline to apply for the CAB Program/NJAA scholarship. Application blanks are available on the Association's Web site, www.angus.org, or from the Junior Activities Department.

Angus Foundation scholarship applications are due May 15. Two \$2,500 and 15 \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded by the Angus Foundation to deserving junior members. Applications can be obtained at www.angus.org or by calling the Junior Activities Department.

June-July junior deadlines

June 15 is the deadline for applicants who want to run for the NJAA Board of Directors. In addition, the names of state delegates to the annual meeting and election are due in to the Junior Activities Department June 15.

Names of state representatives to the National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest should be sent to the Association by June 21.

Outlines for speeches to be given at the NJAA public speaking contest and photographs for the NJAA/Angus Journal photography contest must be in the Association office by June 25.

Delegate nominations due soon

Members of the American Angus Association have until June 30 to return delegate nominating petitions, which were mailed earlier this spring. Members of the Association may nominate themselves or any other Association member from their state.

After June 30, all eligible nominations will be placed on a state ballot and mailed to all members for the election of delegates and alternate delegates to represent their states at the Annual Meeting of the American Angus Association, which will be Nov. 15 in Louisville, Ky.
