- June 20 is the entry deadline for the junior show at the All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity.

NJAS next month

Angus juniors are looking forward to the 2001 NJAS next month in Denver, Colo. The event is set for July 10-14 at the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) facilities.

"Under the Western Sky" is the theme for the event, which is hosted by a group of junior and adult Angus associations from the West. Thousands of juniors and their parents, as well as Angus breeders from across the country, are expected to attend the event.

Juniors will exhibit heifers, bulls, cow-calf pairs and steers. There is a carcass contest with special emphasis on meeting *Certified Angus Beef*[®] (CAB[®]) specifications. State junior Angus associations compete in a team sales competition. Another highlight for the week is the Auxiliary-sponsored All-American *Certified Angus Beef* Cook-Off.

Individuals also will participate in public speaking, poster design, graphic design, photography and state junior association scrapbook contests. State showmanship winners will compete for the national honor of "top showman" at the 35th National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest.

Commercial producers who use the Angus Beef Record Service (BRS) to maintain herd records now can access herd information online at www.angusbrs.com.

Angus BRS users who submit data can view the results after creating a member profile that includes identification information and a private password for logon. Once online, members can view their herd history and breed information, as well as their account history. Sortable summary reports also are available.

This is the first of many steps the Association has planned to make Angus BRS more accessible to commercial producers. There is no fee to enroll in the service; however, a \$2/head fee is charged for each weaning weight submitted.
