#### Iowa hosts NJAS this month

Angus youth and their families will travel to Des Moines, Iowa, this month for the 2000 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS). Scheduled for July 11-15 at the Iowa State Fairgrounds, the event will begin with opening ceremonies on Tuesday evening, July 11.

The show will begin Wednesday with steers, cow-calf pairs and bred-and-owned bulls. Thursday exhibitors will show bred-and-owned females. The first three divisions of owned heifers will show Friday. The NJAS will conclude Saturday, July 15, with the remaining divisions of owned heifers.

The 2000 National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest will be a highlight of the event. Juniors also will participate in leadership competitions throughout the week. An awards ceremony Friday evening will recognize contest winners and six new National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) directors.

## Stassen Angus Farm named historic herd

Stassen Angus Farm, Marshall, Minn., has been recognized as a Historic Angus Herd by the Association. A certificate has been awarded to the Stassen family in honor of this achievement.

Stassen Angus Farm is owned by Eloi Stassen, who joined the Association in February 1950 and has been in the continuous production of Angus cattle ever since. The first cattle were purchased from an Angus farm near Clear Lake, S.D.

The Stassen family has been active in associations, sales and activities for many years. Seven children were raised showing Angus as 4-H and FFA projects. Stassen Angus Farm also was a charter member of the National Cattlemen's Association (NCA).

In 1997 the Stassens exhibited the reserve champion pen of three bulls at the National

Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo. Later that year, they hosted a retirement sale and now maintain 70-80 cows. Eloi's son Dan and his family also live on the farm and manage the herd.

Ownership deadline is Aug. 1 for the junior Angus shows at Kansas City's American Royal and at the NAILE in Louisville. The junior exhibitor must be the sole owner of the animal by Aug. 1, as listed on the certificate. To be eligible to show, issue dates on the certificates must be Aug. 1 or earlier.

Entry deadline for the American Royal is Sept. 20, and the NAILE deadline is Oct. 1.

No late entries will be accepted.
