#### **Madeline Bauer**

Madeline Bauer of Willard, Ohio, is one of two events and education interns for the American Angus Association this summer. She will further develop her event-planning skills by helping organize the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) hosted in July in Wisconsin and the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) conference in August in Montana.

With graduation set for May 2019 from the Ohio State University



(OSU), Bauer is majoring in agricultural communications with

a minor in production agriculture.
