TC Dividend 963 died on June 11 at McCurry Bros. in Kansas. He was 11 years old. Dividend consistently ranked in the top 15 sires of the breed for registrations and in 1994 was the breed's No. 1 sire. He has more than 11,000 progeny in nearly 1,700 herds reported through Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR).

A proven calving-ease sire, Dividend was used extensively in purebred and commercial herds across the country. He currently has more than 3,500 daughters working in nearly 1,300 herds. His daughters have earned him the distinction of Pathfinder Sire. With 133 to his credit, he currently ranks No. 2 in the breed for the number of Pathfinder daughters.

Dividend was owned by TC Ranch, Franklin, Neb., and McCurry Bros., Sedgwick, Kan. He was leased to Accelerated Genetics, Baraboo, Wis.

Michael Ryan, Scottsville, Va., has been hired as a fieldman for the Virginia Angus Association. Ryan grew up showing Angus cattle during his 4-H and FFA careers. IN PASSING

Ruby Brooks of Buffalo, Ky., died on May 19 in Hodgenville, Ky. She was born Aug. 20, 1919. She and her husband never had children, but they cared for others' children with the same loving dedication. She is survived by her husband and two sisters, Francis Wright and Virginia Williams.

Stewart Sewell of Jacksboro, Texas, died May 31 in Fort Worth. He was born Feb. 18, 1919, to Edmund and Gertrude Sewell. He was the third generation of pioneer ranching families. After graduating from Texas Tech,

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Sewell returned to Jacksboro to begin his ranching career.

Sewell was a member of the Flying Tigers and received the Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medal. He had volunteered for what was then known as the U.S. Army Air Corps. He was with a B-25 group in China — the first U.S. bomber group there.

He returned to the United States and taught young Chinese pilots how to fly B-25s at La Junta Air Force Base.

After his military career, Sewell returned to ranching in Texas, where he worked with Angus cattle and breeders. He served as assistant superintendent, superintendent and director of the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show. In 1963 he was president of the Texas Angus Association.

Sewell was a director and chairman of the board of Jacksboro National Bank. He served as a director at Round Rock Baptist Children's Home in Round Rock and Southwestern Baptist Church, Fort Worth.

He owned and bred cutting horses. Sewell was one of the founders of Circle Seven Drilling Co., and he was active in oil and gas production until his death.

Survivors include a daughter, Sheryl of Jacksboro; two sons, Stan Sewell of Fort Worth and Stace of Dallas; and three grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his son Scott and his sister Dorothy Davis.

Afteel Meece Smith of Russell Springs, Ky., died May 22 at Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital in Somerset. She was born in Russell County on Oct. 5, 1920, to Lora Foley Meece and Avery Meece. On Oct. 5, 1939, she married C. Bascum Smith.

Smith devoted her life to her husband, children and grandchildren. She helped her

family with the operation of Smithland Angus Farm.

On Nov. 2, 1941, Struve married Velma Datwyler in Winterset. They lived at the family farm, then moved to a farm southeast of Manning, where the couple lived until his parents retired.

In 1957 Struve demonstrated his abilities as one of the top showmen in the Angus breed when he became herdsman for Treasure Acres in Blairsburg. He helped Paul Benshoof, the owner, become one of the major Angus breeders of that era.

He later moved his family to Creston, Ill., to work at L.B. Pierce and Sons' Woodlawn Farms. Struve moved them back to Iowa to work for Val-Mar Farms in Manning.

In 1965 he received the John Sheets Herdsman Award for being the outstanding cattleman of the year. The next year until his retirement in 1979, Struve worked at Super-Cross Hybrid Seed Corn near Manilla and maintained a small herd of purebreds.

He and Velma built their home in Irwin after his retirement in 1979. He enjoyed woodworking and remained active in the
