

Exhibitors mourn passing of Joe Calderazzo

The Atlantic National lost a dear friend this year.

Joe Calderazzo, one of the show's founding fathers, passed away on May 26 at the age of 58. Although an oral surgeon by trade, Calderazzo was an Angus enthusiast at heart.

In addition to being a founding father of the Atlantic National, Calderazzo also served as show chairman from its inception in 1987 until 1992.

"He was a great friend of mine and a very honest person," says Greg Krueger, current Atlantic National chairman. "If you ever needed a helping hand, he was there."

"For Joe, everything had to be done really well," says Paul Hill, an Atlantic National board member. "He was a perfectionist, and he helped the show in a high-class manner."

Krueger agrees that Calderazzo was a perfectionist and wanted the Atlantic National to be as good as possible. That attention to detail at the show's beginning has made Krueger's job a lot easier, he says.

"Joe did an excellent job. He got us started in the harder years," he says. "Our vision was to have the best show on the East Coast, and I think we have done that. I think we have even come close to being one of the best shows in the country. We try to always keep the family atmosphere."

In addition to having a family atmosphere, the Atlantic National is managed and funded by its breeders.

"It's really an exhibitor show," Krueger says. "I think that was Joe's vision."

That vision has grown from a first-year total of about 200 head of

cattle to more than 500 head this past year. This year exhibitors from 25 states participated.

In 1989 Calderazzo's daughter, Jennifer, donated one of her heifer's embryos to launch a scholarship program, forming the Dr. John A. Babett Education Fund. Named for former show treasurer John Babett, the fund awards thousands of dollars each year to junior members in the form of Merit Awards.

Testimony to the quality of embryos donated to the program, this year's champion bull, WVF HB Atlantic Nat'l Merit, was one of the embryos donated to raise funds for the Merit Award.

After Calderazzo stepped down as show chairman, a new award was established in addition to the Merit Award. This one, however, was in his name.

"We started the Calderazzo Award after Joe left in 1994," Krueger says. "The Calderazzo Award is a volunteer award presented to someone who has gone above and beyond the call of duty to make the show better."

"We presented the Calderazzo Award on Saturday about 1 o'clock, and that was about the same time Joe passed away," Krueger says.

"I found out Joe passed away Saturday night," he says. "It was right during the show, so it took a lot out of the show this year."

"Even though, in the last few years, he wasn't actively involved, everybody knows that in the beginning he devoted a lot of time to get the show where it's at today," Krueger says. "And any time anybody thinks of the Atlantic National, I think they're going to think of Joe."
