Record 768 Cattle Shown at 1993 NJAS



ational Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members and registered Angus cattle from throughout the country gathered July 13-17 in Wichita, Kan., for the 1993 National Junior Angus Show. The 25th

annual event was held at the Kansas Coliseum and hosted a record-breaking 768 head of cattle.

Craig Wallace, Leeton, Mo., judged the breeding cattle. Judge for the steer show was Dave Nichols, Manhattan, Kan.

The show's largest division was the owned heifer category. Topping the 469 owned heifer entries was BC Beauty Juice 248 exhibited by Kyle Conley, Cameron, Mo. The grand heifer, which won the early junior division, is a February 1992 daughter of JR Juice Z005.

Following Conley into the winner's circle with reserve grand champion owned female honors was Erin Foster, Wichita Falls, Texas. Foster's heifer, Swan Elaine 212, is an April 1992 daughter of Leachman Prompter. The heifer first topped the late junior division.

In the bred-and-owned heifer show, Wesley Womack, Bowling Green, Ky., exhibited the grand champion named Womack's Lady Dominique. The June 1992 heifer is sired by Leachman Prompter and first topped the intermediate division.

Reserve grand champion bred-and-owned heifer was WK Unique Peggy owned by Ty Krebs, Gordon, Neb. The heifer first won the late junior title and is an April 1992 daughter of Brost Power Drive. Krebs was named Premier Breeder of the show.

Positive Direction was named grand champion bred-andowned bull. The grand winner was exhibited by Thomas Buchanan III, Fayetteville, Ark. The bull first won the junior division and is a March 1992 son of R&J Distinction.







WK Samson won reserve grand champion steer honors for Ty Krebs. The April 1992 steer is a son of Ankonian Bold Ruler A5208. He weighed in at 1,135 pounds and recorded a 2.47pound WDA.



Steers Grade 83 Percent Choice In NJAS Carcass Contest

The first-ever live animal evaluation seminar, carcass evaluation contest, and carcass contest attracted 29 registered Angus steers and 172 evaluation contestants to the 1993 National Junior Angus Show in Wichita, Kan.

The event took place on Tuesday, July 13. After a parade of the 29 carcass steers, Dave Nichols and Scott Schaake, both of Kansas State University, Manhattan, conducted a live animal evaluation seminar. They pointed out live indicators of carcass merit and explained yield and quality grades. Participants then predicted the carcass merit of six of the live animals entered in the carcass contest.

The carcass steers were processed at IBP, Emporia, Kan. Of the 29 carcass steers, 83 percent graded Choice and 62 percent qualified for the Certified Angus Beef Program. As a group, the 29 steers had an average yield grade of 2.0 and an average fat

Maurer's steer finished fifth on the rail grading high Choice with a 2.09 yield grade. thickness of 0.34 inches.

These averages surpass the industry averages revealed in the National Cattlemen's Association's National Beef Quality Audit (NBQA) conducted in 1991. The NBQA found industry averages of 0.59 inch fat thickness and a 3.2 yield grade.

The grand champion carcass steer was an April 1992 son of Kessler's Rainman 002 exhibited by Crystal Nelson of Davey, Neb. The steer weighed in at 1,193 pounds and produced a 704pound carcass. Fat thickness was 0.16 inches with a ribeye area of 14.3 square inches. The carcass graded average Choice with a 1.5 yield grade.

Cindy Hooper of Bliss, Idaho, exhibited the reserve grand champion carcass. Weighing 1,093 pounds, the steer was an April 1992 son of Fairfield Dark Star P57. The carcass weighed 696 pounds with 0.28 inch fat thickness and a 14.4 square inch ribeye. Hooper's steer graded average Choice with a 1.74 yield grade.

Contest participants were scored based on their predictions compared to the steers' actual measurements. In the carcass evaluation competition, Laura Hooper of Bliss, Idaho, won the junior division. Casey Kruse of Kersey, Colo., was first in the intermediate division. Will Grote, Mason, Texas, topped the senior division, and Jim Hallman, Cleburne, Texas, won the adult division.

Season prime rib with garlic powder, salt, pepper and teriyaki sauce. Work into meat for added flavor. Wrap prime rib in heavy aluminum foil, place in oven-proof pan and put on grill. Meat should be cooked for 2 1/2 to 3 hours, depending on desired doneness.

Slice into desired thickness and serve with the meat drippings.

 1/2 pound boneless Certified Angus Beef™ chuck steak, 1"thick
1/4 cup lemon juice

Combine lemon juice, water, oil, salt and dillweed in a bowl or plastic bag. Place steak in marinade and turn to coat. Marinate steak overnight, turning once. Remove steak from marinade. Press pepper into both sides of meat. Broil over medium coals 8-10 minutes per side. Carve into thin slices. 222 calories, 11 grams fat, 85 mg cholesterol, 3.2 mg iron per serving




Doctor Pepper Steaks The Stock Exchange, Edmund, Okla. *first place recipe, adult division*

4 10-oz. Certified Angus Beef™ tenderloin steaks, 2" thick 1/2 cup fresh crack peppercorns 4 oz. cognac 1/2 cup melted butter lemon juice parsley chives

Marinade:

- 8 oz. original Ott's salad dressing (catalina style, with horseradish)
- 4 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 4 tablespoons soy sauce
- 4 tablespoons pineapple juice
- Marinate steaks for three hours. Remove from marinade (reserve for later) and press crushed peppercorns into steaks with palm of hand. Grill steaks over medium heat for 1/2 hour, turning every 7 1/2 minutes with tongs. DO NOT USE A FORK. Baste frequently with reserved marinade while cooking. Steaks will have a pink center. Flambe' by placing steaks on platter, sprinkling with cognac (1 oz. per steak) and lighting for about 3 seconds. Serve with a mixture of butter, lemon juice, parsley and chives.




