Cashley Ahlberg, a Kansas State University (K-State) Department of Animal Sciences and Industry Graduate student was recognized May 23 as the recipient of the Larry Corah Outstanding Graduate Student Award.

Ahlberg, originally from Longmont, Colo., received the Outstanding Ph.D. Student Award which includes a \$1,500 scholarship. She is a graduate research assistant pursuing a doctoral degree in animal breeding and genetics. Ahlberg's research project is related to water intake and efficiency in beef cattle.

She has served as a teaching assistant (TA) in both genetics and animal breeding. Her advisor, Megan Rolf, says, "Cashley has exceptional data analysis skills, and she has already been a coauthor or first author on three peer-reviewed journal articles and four abstracts."

The award is presented in honor of Larry Corah, who served for 25 years

as a K-State Animal Science and Industry Department Beef Extension and Research Specialist. After retiring from K-State, he went on to work for the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) as director of production systems and then served 17 years as the CAB LLC Vice President of Supply. The scholarship funds are supported by the Larry Corah Graduate Student Enhancement Fund.

The award winners are selected based on scholastic achievement, research activity and success, teaching activities, faculty evaluation, and overall contributions to the mission of the department.




