# Rule 504 reminder for bulls born after Jan. 1, 2018

In the September 2018 meeting of the American Angus Association Board of Directors, the Board voted to update Rule 504 from the Breeder's Reference Guide (the updated portion of the rule is noted below). Bulls born on or after Jan. 1, 2018, are reaching breeding age, and according to Rule 504, these bulls must be tested for the full suite of conditions to qualify for artificial insemination (AI) certificates.

Rule 504: DNA-Marker-Typing

A record of the DNA-marker type, or blood type if identified before January 1, 2001, of all bulls that are the source of semen for the purpose of Artificial Insemination must be filed with the Association before calves that are sired artificially by such bulls shall be eligible for registration or before "Out of Herd" Al Service Certificates may be obtained from the Association. *The full suite of known commercially available tests for the genetic conditions monitored by the American Angus Association will be required for all bulls, born on or after January 1, 2018, that are the source of semen for the purpose of Artificial Insemination.* 

# **Return delegate ballots**

Convention of Delegates this November. Delegate nominations received by the June 7 deadline were used to prepare state/district ballots with the names of eligible nominees. Ballots were mailed in early July to all eligible voting members.

All ballots must be received in the Association office no later than 4:30 p.m. CDT Tuesday, Aug. 6, to be counted. To ensure a valid ballot, vote for no more than the designated number of delegates listed at the top of the ballot and remember to sign the document before mailing.

Elected delegates will conduct Association business at the 136th Annual Convention of Delegates during the Angus Convention Nov. 2-4 in Reno, Nev.

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suite of expected progeny differences (EPDs) and dollar value indexes (\$Values).

- No minimum EPD requirements.
- Any bull that is a potential carrier for any genetic condition recognized by the Association must be tested free of that condition(s) by the entry deadline of Nov. 15, 2019.
- A non-refundable entry fee of \$400 must accompany the application at time of entry.
- All bulls must be calved after Jan.
  1, 2017. All bulls born before Jan.
  1, 2019, must have a complete breeding soundness exam within 30 days of the sale date.
- All bulls must be enrolled in Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR<sup>®</sup>) with official weights processed prior to the sale book deadline, Nov. 15, 2019.
- All bulls must conform to health regulations of the NWSS and American Angus Association.
- All bulls must be entered in the NWSS Open Bull Show or in the Pen and Carload Show.

This year there will no longer be a show to establish sale order. All bulls will be evaluated at time of check-in and sale order will be established by sale management and two outside industry professionals. The bulls will be displayed at 12:30 p.m. in a specific location on the Hill and the sale will start promptly at 2 p.m. in the Beef Palace Arena leading off with the Angus Foundation Heifer Package. With the new format, pen and carload bulls are encouraged to participate in this year's event.

The sale will be co-managed by Jeff Mafi, Mark Sims and Alex Tolbert. The auctioneer will be Jim Birdwell, Fletcher, Okla.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).
