# Handling the herd

Over the various leadership roles I have held over the years, there have been a unique number of challenges in my herd. Don't get me wrong, this is not handling the herd in terms of cattle. However, I will be discussing effective leadership over your "herd."

Some of the biggest challenges I have been faced with include connecting to the audience, keeping everyone engaged and deferring leadership to those with more experience.

Connecting to your audience is always the trickiest part of being a leader, in my opinion. There are many factors that go into connecting with others. Examples of this include age and background. Connecting with younger kids requires an entirely different leadership style vs. a room full of adults.

Another area that must be considered is what knowledge and background others have. Using the children example once again, it is safe to say they aren't as knowledgeable compared to a group of adults. This is also predicated on where they came from.

Farmers and ranchers comprise less than 2% of the U.S. population. This means most people you will communicate with, as well as lead, will not fully understand the rationale behind our decisions. To alleviate this issue, a more in-depth explanation is required to hopefully broaden their understanding of the topic. How you as a leader take the steps above can produce drastically different results.

This next topic is once again age-specific. It is easier to keep engagement of older individuals compared to their younger counterparts. Keeping everyone

engaged can be challenging at times, while at others it seems to fall easily into place. With children and the general youth, keep them active to increase engagement. Periodically break to allow for an activity where they get to have fun and enjoy themselves.

Being a leader means getting the most out of your audience, and that entails catering to their needs to ensure there is a connection throughout. I can think of several times during 4-H meetings where the kids would start to drift to sleep or just become bored with the meeting.

The solution? Get everyone up and get the blood flowing. A game of tag, the human knot or a relay race are all prime examples of things that can keep youth engaged. For adults, a simple brain break can often do the trick. A five-minute period where there are no strenuous mental activities can reengage and reenergize the audience. Whether this is a coffee break, responding to messages on the phone or just chit-chatting with others, this can help keep activities brief and concise.

This last topic seems a bit contrary to popular belief. Everyone tends to believe a leader must be at the helm of the ship at all times. This, however, is not true. Being a leader and handling the herd effectively means knowing when to lead and when to let others lead. There is a time and a place for

a leader to guide everyone in the right direction. However, once they find their own footing in the right direction, stepping away can prove invaluable to the growth of others.

Additionally, deferring leadership to those who are more knowledgeable is never a bad idea. On many committees, there is a position called "Ex Officio." This position is a former officer that stays on to provide knowledge and insight only someone with that experience could have. While they seldom have any voting role, their wisdom can often help guide others in the right direction.

Hopefully, I have provided some insight on how I manage my herd. Experiment with your leadership style to find what works best for you and can get the most out of everyone.

Remember, there is no "one size fits all" leadership style. There are going to be times when you struggle to keep an audience engaged or remain efficient, but that is perfectly fine. Being a leader is a lifelong learning experience, and all you can hope to do is keep learning and keep trying.
