Association solution

The Angus breed in America was essentially built on solutions.

When George Grant brought over four Angus bulls to Victoria, Kan., in 1873, he had no idea the lasting legacy he would make on the breed.

Grant's problem was that the Texas Longhorns were not as profitable as he had hoped, nor were they able to withstand the harsh winters. His solution was to implement Angus genetics to create a heartier animal that could add more muscle to finished carcasses.

The seed of solutions was rooted in America after that year, as producers found new ways to implement Angus characteristics into their herd, and eventually, how to use expected progeny differences (EPDs) to produce cattle they desired.

Within the last 10 years, the American Angus Association has developed several innovative EPD solutions. Through Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI), the American Angus Association has worked to create genetic tools to help producers deal with high-altitude disease (HAD) in cattle living in higher-elevated climates.

Producers in Colorado, Montana and other Plains states witnessed

many cattle having heart and lung issues, leading to heart failure and eventual death. AGI developed the Pulmonary Arterial Pressure (PAP) EPD that allows producers to select cattle against the gene and cull the cattle that are high-risk. With this new technology, the Association is able to continually improve the Angus gene pool and provide a more profitable cow prospect to producers.

Another solution that the Association has developed is the Hair Shedding (HS) EPD. Cattle typically shed their winter coats in early spring, however, issues with prolonged shedding can cost a producer as cattle use more energy to regulate body temperature rather than supplying energy to produce milk or meat. Hair shedding is moderately heritable, so it can be passed to offspring.

A specific string of progeny carrying poor HS EPDs is less environmentally adaptive and thus less productive than the rest of the herd. Through the use of the HS EPD, producers are able to evaluate their herd, identify cows that are poor shedders and make breeding decisions accordingly for the betterment of the herd.

Finally, the Association produced an EPD to help solve a major problem for many Angus producers in the United States with the Foot Angle (Angle) and Claw Set (Claw) scores. The cattle we produce today are only as good as the hooves they stand on. If our cattle can't walk to the feedbunk or maintain their body weight during the heat of calving season, they are unable to perform to the best of their abilities, ultimately costing the producer time and money.

With this new EPD, producers are able to compare using the Association Foot Score Card and select against poor foot structure among their cattle when making breeding decisions.

As it's clear to see, the American Angus Association has not slowed down in the creation and development of solutions to better serve its producers and the cattle that they care for. Only time will tell what the next big solution will be in future years.
