Kentucky Junior Wins Carcass Contest

Thirteen of the fifty steers shown in Omaha competed in the carcass competition. Among them 12 (92%) graded Choice and five (38%) met all the Certified Angus Beef requirements. These compared well to recent years, yet contest officials noted some disappointment in the average yield grade of 3.4 and the average rib eye area of 1.57 square inches per hundredweight.

Last year Sam Lawson of Nicholasville, Ky. took home reserve champion honors in the carcass contest held in conjunction with the 1989 National Junior Angus Show. This year his entry in the carcass contest was selected grand champion. His April '89 son of R&J Taurus 1186, had a live weight of 1,238 pounds and carcass weight of 789 pounds. It had

64.46 dressing percent, live weight per day of age (WDA) of 2.68 pounds, carcass WDA of 1.73, .05 fat thickness and a 12.6 rib eye area (REA). Total retail yield was 74.5 with a carcass price per hundredweight (cwt.) of \$122. The carcass was assigned a quality grade of average Choice and a yield grade of 3.1. It qualified for CAB, earning \$787.50 in premiums.

Earning reserve champion carcass honors and premiums was Wendy Peterson of Tampico, Ill. Her 1,253-pound May '89 steer, sired by O'Neills Renovator, had a quality grade of low Choice and 2.7 yield grade. It recorded a live WDA of 2.87, carcass WDA of 1.81, carcass weight of 790, 63.05 dressing percent, 0.4 fat thickness, and 12.7 REA. Total retail yield was 76.5

Winning Cook-Off Recipes Junior Division

NEBRASKA BEEF SUPREME

- 4 lbs. CAB chuck roast, very lean
- 14 oz. catsup
- 1 envelope instant onion soup mix
- 1 12-oz. can of beer

Put the roast in crock pot. Cover with other ingredients. Cook on low for 8 hours.

Prior to serving, skim off fat, remove two cups juice from crock pot and place in sauce pan. Thicken with two tablespoons of cornstarch and 1/4 cup brown sugar by bringing to boil on top of stove. Add the thickened mixture back to the juices in the crock pot and heat until all juices are thickened.
