## Michigan herd given historic designation

Taylor Farms, Decatur, Mich., has been designated a Historic Angus Herd by the Association. DeVir Taylor owns the herd, which was started in 1949.

Miss Burgess Bandolier V, a July 1946 daughter of Cesars Evader Progress, was the foundation female of the herd. The bred heifer was purchased as a 4-H project from Vaughan Brothers, Albion, Mich., for \$700.

A certificate, signed by the president of the American Angus Association, has been sent to the Taylors to recognize this honor.

#### Fred C. Frey & Sons named **Historic Angus Herd**

Fred C. Frey & Sons, Quarryville, Pa., has been recognized as a Historic Angus Herd by the American Angus Association. The family has been presented with an official certificate for achieving the honor.

Fred C. Frey established the herd in 1948 with the purchase of 11 bred heifers. Unfortunately, he was killed in an auto accident later that year and never saw the calves born. His son, Fred H. Frey, who was 16 at the time, took over the herd, and the Frey family has continued the production of Angus cattle ever since.

Through the years two more generations have become involved, Fred H. Frey's son Fritz C. Frey and grandson Fred Christian Frey.

The herd, which includes 150 cows and 45 yearling heifers, is also known as Twin Oak Farms, "We never chased the fads, but instead bred good, solid, usable and saleable cattle that were bred to perform on roughages only," Fred H. Frey stated in the application.
