The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP) that the American Angus Association began in 1972. Junior Angus breeders must apply for the awards and meet point requirements in many areas of participation before receiving the honors.

Applicants are evaluated in the areas of junior Angus association activities, participation in showmanship and leadership events, using performance testing to improve their herds, and progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.
