hink about three years of planning and preparation, volunteers, committees, promotion, phone calls, e-mail, and meetings. Visualize 950 head of Angus cattle, 300 stock trailers, numerous tractor-trailers, hundreds of extended-cab pickups, nearly a mile of tie-outs and a few thousand people gathered for the largest single-breed beef show in the world.

Add to the picture 13 contests and competitions, a silent auction, a golf tournament, an ice-skating party, a banana split feast and opening ceremonies that included a circus parade.


Continue with meetings for advisors, exhibitors and American Angus Auxiliary members, an annual meeting, a showmanship contest and an awards function that included the presentation of 28 college scholarships, contest prizes and awards to more than 240 junior Angus members.

Don't stop now because you still have a junior dance and a casino night for the parents to fit into the picture. Finally, add in the cattle show, which included a carcass steer contest, 87 on-hoof cattle classes, the naming of 17 division champions and reserve champions, the slapping of seven grand champions and reserve grand champions, and two state-group competitions.

While I can sum up in just a few words what three years of planning and an incredible weeklong event may look like from the outside, the experience gained from participating in the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) can't be summarized in any such fashion.


These pages just scratch the surface of the abundance of stories and opportunities that

you can discover by talking with the young men and women involved in the junior Angus programs and specifically the NIAS.


Carpe diem — seize the day!
