Angus Foundation offers more than \$2.9 million in scholarships since 1998.

Scholarships: the leading reason students are able to pursue higher education. On average, college tuition has increased by more than 200% in the last 20 years. The Foundation not only recognizes the outstanding leadership of junior members, they have provided financial footholds for undergraduate and graduate students.

A branch of the Foundation's mission includes education.
Awarding 111 scholarships at the 2018 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), the Foundation adhered to supporting youth development. Scholarships were also awarded for higher education and attending leadership development events.

"We are proud to make an investment in the industry's future," says Milford Jenkins, Angus Foundation president. "These young people are the leaders of today and tomorrow, but we could not support them without the help of our very generous donors from across the Angus industry. They make these

opportunities possible for our youth."

A five-member committee evaluates the scholarship applications and considers National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) involvement, state association participation, leadership and other criteria. Since 1998, the Angus Foundation has awarded more than \$2.9 million in scholarships, for both undergraduate and graduate students.

The 2018 scholarship recipients were recognized at the NJAS.

Scholarship winners

Patrick "Pat" Goggins Memorial Angus Scholarship. The family of Pat Goggins provided an \$11,750 gift, for the Pat Goggins Memorial Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund.

Goggins was a publisher, columnist, auctioneer, livestock market owner, real-estate broker and longtime Angus breeder from Billings, Mont. He gained great prestige in the Angus industry working as a fieldman and ringman for Western Livestock Journal, the Montana Farmer Stockman and Western Livestock Reporter.

A self-taught auctioneer, Goggins became one of the leading purebred livestock auctioneers in the United States. Over the years, Goggins' keen business sense led him to acquire three auction markets, numerous ranches and feedlots, the first livestock video auction, a real estate company in addition to other business ventures.

Numerous Angus breeders and friends have made memorial gifts to the fund that now surpasses \$15,000. The endowment generates a scholarship presented to an undergraduate student each summer at the NJAS. Selection criteria for the scholarship include first preference given to Angus youth from Montana.

This year the Patrick "Pat" Goggins Memorial Angus Scholarship, in the amount of \$1,000, goes to Jordyn Wagner, Billings, Mont.

Leadership Awards Endowment Fund. A new scholarship was announced for 2016 in memory of DeEtta (Jones) Wood. DeEtta and her family have enjoyed raising purebred Angus cattle at their Wood Angus Farm in Willow Spring, N.C.

DeEtta was more than an Angus breeder, she was also a leader, serving the North Carolina Angus Auxiliary and as an advisor for the North Carolina Junior Angus Association.

Her legacy will be carried on in perpetuity in the Angus breed through the DeEtta Wood Memorial Scholarship and Achievement/ Leadership Awards Endowment Fund. The endowment will fund a \$1,000 scholarship given annually with preference to North Carolina Angus youth.

This year's winner is Cara Smith, Pleasant Garden, N.C.

Joseph and Susanne Bush/J&S
Ranch Scholarship and Junior
Activity Endowment Fund. Joe
and Susanne Bush of J&S Ranch,
Gatesville, Texas, began ranching in
2005 and started their Angus herd
three years later. The Bushes are
U.S. Army veterans with more than
40 years combined military service.
They became involved with the Texas
Angus Association, the Southwestern
Cattle Raisers Association and the
American Angus Association. Their
passion for the Angus industry
fueled their decision to name the

Angus Foundation as the primary charitable beneficiary for the bulk of their estate. A \$10,000 cash gift in 2015 was announced, creating the Joseph and Susanne Bush, J&S Ranch Scholarship and Junior Activity Endowment Fund. Each year, a different Angus junior from either Texas or Mississippi will receive a \$500 scholarship.

The winner of the Joseph and Susanne Bush, J&S Ranch Scholarship is Faith Massingill, Hamilton, Texas.

Cory Watt Memorial Scholarship. The Cory Watt Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund was established following the Feb. 19, 2015, passing of Cory Watt, 22, of Iva, S.C., after a prolonged battle with cancer. A lifelong Angus breeder, Watt was halfway through his term as chairman of the National Junior Angus Board (NJAB). He was a faithful steward of Angus cattle and a

positive role model for Angus youth.

Led by Kevin and Lydia Yon and their family with the donation of an Angus female, other family, friends and industry role models have raised a memorial of more than \$37,000 in Cory's memory to fund a scholarship to help juniors pursue higher education. While he is no longer with us, Cory will remain an inspiration, and his memory will be honored in the NJAA and the American Angus Association for generations to come.

This scholarship is in honor of her late husband, Ed Minix, and herself. The fund will generate an annual \$2,500 scholarship and was awarded for the first time at the 2014 NJAS. The balance of the annual investment earnings will be

used for youth activities, including the Raising the Bar conference and the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) conference.

Established in 2014 with contributions in memory of the late Stan Prox, the Stan Prox Memorial LEAD Award covers the registration cost for one NJAA member attending the LEAD conference. Angus Foundation Richard L. Spader Scholarships. Richard L. "Dick" Spader was responsible for starting the Angus Foundation during his tenure as executive vice president of the American Angus Association. Upon his death, his family established a scholarship fund in his memory, started with the auctioning of the first five copies of *A Historic Angus Journey*, written by Keith Evans, and expanded through contributions from members across the country.

Angus/Talon Youth Educational Learning Program Scholarships.
Camron "Cam" Cooper, owner of the Talon Ranch located in Twin Bridges, Mont., loved the land and Angus cattle. She believed in educating our children as the future of the beef industry. At the Angus Foundation's Supporter Recognition Event in Louisville, Ky., in 2009, Cooper announced that she had named the Angus Foundation as a charitable beneficiary of her estate.

Cooper established the Angus/ Talon Youth Educational Learning Program Endowment Fund with outright cash gifts through the Angus Legacy Society to give \$5,000 undergraduate scholarships in 2010 to 10 Angus youth who satisfied the first preference for field of study in animal science and range management, had a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA, with pre-veterinary medicine students specializing in bovine (large) animal practice also given strong preference. The \$5,000 scholarships are renewable for up to four years contingent upon the recipient's meeting the requirements.

Gary Brost LEAD Award. In honor of his accomplishments in the Angus breed, friends and family of the late Gary Brost of Harrodsburg, Ind., have created the Gary Brost LEAD Award Endowment Fund. Brost, an Angus breeder for many years, was a pioneer in the Angus business. In addition to raising two national champion Angus bulls, he was also named a master breeder at the All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity.

This fund will annually award two (or more) NJAA members with resources necessary to defray registration costs to attend the LEAD conference. Preference will be given to applicants with a farm/ranch background from the states of Indiana and Illinois. The Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application will be used to select recipients, who remain eligible to receive other scholarships from the Angus Foundation or local, state, regional and national Angus-related entities.

Oliver A. Hansen/Laudmere Farm Angus Scholarship. The legacy of Oliver A. Hansen will continue through a \$10,000 scholarship endowment that will provide one college-bound Angus junior member from Iowa a scholarship each year.

Hansen was an active member of the American Angus Association.

He grew up in Dixon, Iowa, and assisted his father with the Angus herd at Laudmere Farm, which was established in 1931. He held several leadership roles in the Eastern Iowa Angus Association and was a strong advocate for Angus cattle and the ag industry. In 2009, he was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation. Oliver's sons, Ron Hansen of Durant, Iowa, and Tom Hansen of Enoch, Utah, chose to honor their father and family by creating the scholarship endowment in the name of their father and the farm.

The recipient of the Oliver A. Hansen Family/Laudmere Farm Angus Scholarship must have at one time been a NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the American Angus Association. The recipient must also be a resident of lowa and a member

or past member of the lowa Junior Angus Association for at least four consecutive years. Graduating high school seniors or students currently enrolled in college are eligible. The scholarship must be applied to undergraduate studies and is applicable to any field of study.

The recipient of the 2018 Oliver Hansen/Laudmere Farm scholarship in the amount of \$500 was Taylor Duckett, Tipton, Iowa.

James E. Horton Junior Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund.
Gregg and Lile Blythe established the James E. Horton Angus Scholarship Endowment Fund to honor Gregg's longtime friend, mentor and Angus partner, James Edwin Horton Jr.
The fund was started with a gift of \$20,000 in 2006. Today it is funded at more than \$30,000 as Alabama Angus breeders and other family members have continued to contribute to the fund in honor of "Mr. Ed," as he was fondly known.

A leader in the Angus breed for many years, Horton served as a director and president of the American Angus Association during the 70s. He was instrumental in the acquisition of the *Angus Journal* and establishing the *Certified Angus Beef*® (CAB®) brand, and he led the efforts for the eventual creation of the Angus Foundation.

Jean Ann (Neumeyer) Bojorquez Memorial Angus Scholarship. In October 2007, Bob and Hollyce Neumever of Javnbee Ranch, Bonners Ferry, Idaho, established the Jean Ann (Neumeyer) Bojorquez Memorial Angus Scholarship, in memory of their daughter, with a \$10,000 gift to the Angus Foundation. Jean Ann was very active in the Angus breed, showing Angus cattle and competing in junior activities at local, state, regional and national levels. As a young adult, she continued her involvement in the Angus breed, owning cows with her parents.

Scholarship. Developed by the 2009-2010 National Junior Angus Board (NJAB), the objective of the NJAA Alumni and Friends Scholarship Endowment Fund is to create more scholarship opportunities for deserving Angus youth of the NJAA and to inspire other juniors and alumni to give back to the NJAA.

Bob and Margaret Duprey of Cherry Knoll Farm, West Grove, Pa., have pledged a total of \$25,000 in matching funds to support the NJAA Board Alumni and Friends Scholarship Endowment Fund. A different recipient will receive the scholarship each year. The Angus Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship Program application is used to select the scholarship recipient each year.

Scholarship of \$2,000 went to Jordyn Wagner, Billings, Mont.

Roscoe L. Richardson Memorial Scholarship. The late Roscoe L. Richardson of Dracut, Mass., was a longtime member and officer of the New England Angus Association. He loved Angus cattle and the associations he developed from being an active Angus breeder. He always found time to support Angus activities in New England and to help other breeders.

Funded at his death in 1988 with in-memory contributions to the Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation in Great Barrington, Mass., the Roscoe L. Richardson Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund of \$10,000 was later established with the Angus Foundation in early 2007. Created to continue his ideals of helping young people remain

connected to agriculture, the primary selection criteria for this scholarship is to support Angus youth from New England states.

The \$500 Roscoe L. Richardson Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Jayne Bannister, Kent, N.Y.
