For the second year in a row, the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) selected three individuals to take home the top honors of the Stockman Award during the 50th National Junior Angus Show (NJAS).

This year's recipients are Lauren Wolter, Aviston, Ill., junior division; Ellie Kidwell, Walhonding, Ohio, intermediate division; and Jayne Bannister, Kent, N.Y., senior division.

To be eligible for the award, juniors must have competed in the cattle judging, quiz bowl, written exam and skill-a-thon contests while at NJAS. The total score of the contests were combined to select the winners. The top individuals were selected based on age division.

Bannister won the Stockman Award two years in a row and says it is an honor to receive it again. She

credits her success to showcasing her talents outside the show ring.

She says participating in the contest is a great experience and encourages all juniors to try it at least once in their career. Wolter also adds juniors should not be afraid of trying new contests.

"I would advise other juniors to just try the different contests," Wolter says. "You'll learn something just from trying it. You might not win the award or contest at first, but the key is to just

keep trying."
