## In passing

**Maj. Gen. John H. Jacobsmeyer Jr.,** USAF, Ret. Gen. Jacobsmeyer, 88, Portsmouth, N.H., passed away

May 24.



Known to family as "Jack" and to friends as "Jake," he was born in 1930 in Portsmouth, N.H., to John H. and Priscilla (Hooper)

Jacobsmeyer Sr. He and his brother, Bill, grew up there during the Great Depression and World War II with the hard-working, small-community values of that period. He graduated from the University of New Hampshire in 1952 with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. As a distinguished military graduate of the AFROTC program, he entered active duty with an assignment to missile and flight testing.

After Jack's retirement from the Air Force in 1981, he returned to New Hampshire, settling in Northwood to operate Spring Run Farm, where he raised black Angus cattle, provided some defense consulting services and supported town affairs.

Although his professions were in engineering and agriculture, he also had a knack for artistic design that became visible in a number of his home projects.

Jack is survived by his wife of 65 years, Patricia; brother William Edward (Anna Mae) Jacobsmeyer; children Joanne Elizabeth (Matthew) Sprott, Jay Michael (Joyce) Jacobsmeyer, Susan Eileen (Paul) Kowalski, John Henry III (Katrina) Jacobsmeyer; eight grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.

Marjorie Maude (Wright) Howell,

95, of Daleville, Ind., passed away July 9.

She was born Oct. 4, 1922, on the family farm owned by her parents, Claude E. and Mary Patterson Wright, near Cowan, Ind.

Marjorie was raised during the Great Depression and learned at an early age the value of hard work at her family's dairy farm. She never knew an idle moment and was the perfect example to her family of industry and diligence.

She was the salutatorian of Cowan High School Class of 1940 and studied home economics at Ball State Teachers College where she graduated in 1944. She taught at Mt. Summit High School for two years before she married Warren D. Howell in 1946.


