

Funds for the Future

Angus youth received a record \$230,000 in scholarships and LEAD awards at 2020 National Junior Angus Show.

As higher education costs continue to rise, the Angus Foundation continues to raise the bar on its investment in the next generation. Through the generosity of Angus Foundation donors, academic scholarships will offset the cost of undergraduate and graduate degrees for National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members. A record 97 scholarships and Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) conference awards were earned by Angus youth totaling \$230,000 July 25 in a virtual presentation conducted during the 2020 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Tulsa, Okla.

“We received an unprecedented number of applications this year,” says Thomas Marten, Angus Foundation executive director. “We are thankful for our generous Angus Fund and endowment donors. Year after year, they step forward to encourage our Angus youth in their studies as well as in leadership and career development programs and cutting-edge research to advance the breed.”

A five-member committee consisting of industry experts, Angus Foundation Board members, Angus breeders and NJAA board members evaluate the applications. The committee considers involvement, participation, leadership, service,

career goals and other criteria set forth in the scholarships’ fund agreements. Since 1998 the Angus Foundation has awarded more than \$3.1 million in undergraduate and graduate scholarships.

In 2010, Ray Sims became the first auctioneer in more than 50 years to receive the prestigious Saddle & Sirloin Club's Portrait Award. During his 46-year career, Sims traveled throughout the United States, selling for both large- and small-scale livestock breeders, including U.S. senators and three U.S. presidents — at more than an estimated 7,000 auctions with the majority of these being registered Angus cattle sales. Camron “Cam” Cooper, owner of the Talon Ranch located in Twin Bridges, Mont., established the Angus/Talon Youth Educational Learning Program Endowment Fund. The endowment gives undergraduate scholarships to 10 Angus youth who

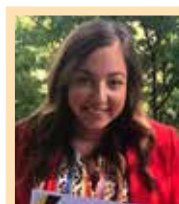

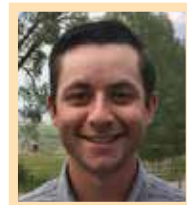

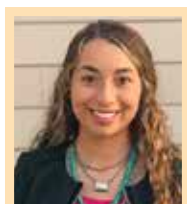
Iowa Junior Angus Association Scholarships – \$750

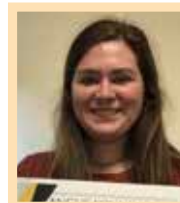
In 2009, the WSNJAS organization established a fund in the Angus Foundation to support a future NJAS
