

Auxiliary Announces Scholarship Winners

A former Miss American Angus from Derwood, Md., Susan is in charge of public relations for the American Angus Auxiliary. She was the judges' choice for the top girls' scholarship in 1979.

It took more than eight hours, but by the evening of Aug. 2 the judges for the American Angus Auxiliary scholarship program had chosen this year's winners. Judging took place during the American Angus Breeders' Futurity in Louisville and five girls and three boys were selected from among the 18 girls and 14 boys who

The \$1,100 first-place purse in the girls' division was awarded to Barbara Baylor of Hanna City, Ill. The daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Richard Baylor, Barbara has been a member of the Illinois Junior Angus Assn. for five years and the American Angus Assn. for six years. She is presently serving as secretary-treasurer of her state association and was a candidate for the National Junior Angus Assn. Board of Directors. Active in high school, Barbara was a member of the marching, pep, and concert bands, and participated in the science and drama clubs. While in 4-H, she held all offices in her club. 4-H projects included public speaking, livestock judging and showmanship. Both in 1978 and 1980, she received awards for her beef projects and received the "I Dare You Award" in 1981. Barbara is a member of National Honor Society and in 1981 was named a Sterling Merit Scholar and Illinois State Scholar.

Mark Kreul of Fennimore, Wis. won the \$1,100 first place award in the boys' division. The 17-year-old son of Mr. & Mrs. Roger Kreul is a 5-year member of the American Angus Assn. and an 8-year member of his state junior Angus association. Currently president of the Wisconsin Junior Angus Assn., he also has served as vice president and treasurer. Mark is a member of the National Honor Society and in 1979 was accepted into WHO'S WHO AMONG AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS IN MUSIC & AGRICULTURE. An 8-year member of his 4-H livestock judging team, Mark has served as secretary and vice president of his 4-H club. In 1981, he received the Star Chapter Farmer Award and the Wisconsin Farmer Degree for his FFA work. This is the third agriculture-related scholarship he has received this year. He has already won the Wisconsin Livestock and Meat Council Scholarship and the Fennimore Vo-Ag Scholarship.

Receiving the second award of \$700 in the girls' division was Jill Frisbee. A Madison, Mo., native, Jill is the daughter of Mrs. Judy Frisbee. A 7-year member of the Missouri Junior Angus Assn., she recently converted her membership in the American Angus Assn. from junior to life. She also is active in the Monroe County Junior Angus Assn. and the Green Hills junior Angus group. Jill is listed in both WHO'S WHO AMONG AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS and WHO'S WHO IN MUSIC. A 7-year 4-H member, she has served as president, vice president, secretary and reporter. In 1977, she was named top girl Angus showman at the Missouri State Fair. In 1981, she was chosen as a member of the state FFA choir. Jill is currently Missouri Angus Queen and has been awarded the bronze and silver awards in the American Angus Assn. National Junior Recognition Program.

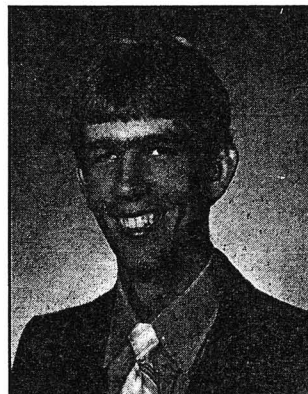

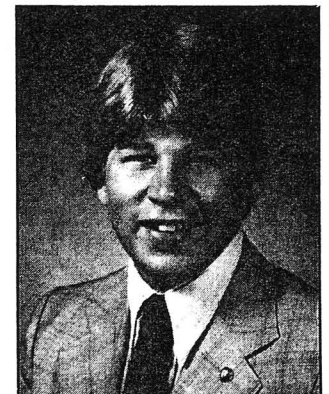

Listed in WHO'S WHO AMONG AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS, Amy was a student council member and was active in French Club and FFA.
