NATIONAL JUNIOR ANGUS SHOW

Doctor Pepper 25 IA first topped the junior division in the bred-and-owned bull competition, then went on to claim reserve championship honors. Price Irving, Greenfield, Ind., led out this Sir Wms Warrant son.



California juniors earned the first-place trophy with this lineup in the group-of-five competition. Iowa juniors captured second place while groups from Idaho and Illinois finished third and fourth, respectively.

Reserve champion winner also stepped up from the junior yearlings. She was Blubl Lady Mistress Garner, a January 1982 daughter of Sir Wms Warrant exhibited by host state representative Kurt Greiman, Garner.

Bred-and-owned classes may have seen fewer numbers, but competition was just as stiff and the grand champion title earned by Grahams Lucky Lady carried plenty of clout. John Graham, Gilman, bred and exhibited the April 1982 Fairfield Hi Guy daughter who had already made an impressive debut in Denver. Ryan Cotton, Howell, Mich., led intermediate winner Premier Victoria 110A to the reserve grand champion position.

In its second year, the bull show had expanded to include 42 entries, all bred and owned by the juniors. Clifford Simmons II, Williamston, Mich., claimed top purple with intermediate champion Omegan Royal. Price Irving, Greenfield, Ind., took reserve honors with junior winner Doctor Pepper 25 I A.

Both cow-calf champions had been divisional winners in last year's bred-and-owned competition. Jud Baldrige of North Platte, Neb., brought JB Queen Peggy 211 back with her Pine Drive Big Sky bull calf to take top honors. John Wagner, Harlan, Kan., showed the reserve champion Bandomere 2 JHW and her QLC Target heifer calf.

The list of champions was impressive and many of the winners have solid reputations in open shows on a national level. The strength of this junior show is certainly a tribute to the capabilities and ambitions of our breed's youth.

Such an event, however, is not possible without the guidance of many devoted parents and leaders. The hosting Iowa juniors thanked many for their interest and support, but special recognition went out to a few. One of those enthusiasts was Lyle Haring, Association field representative to whom the Centennial event was dedicated.

Activities during the four days included the annual showmanship contest, get-togethers, barbecue and dance, a first-time cook-off competition and much more. It's no wonder this gathering has become a family affair for so many.

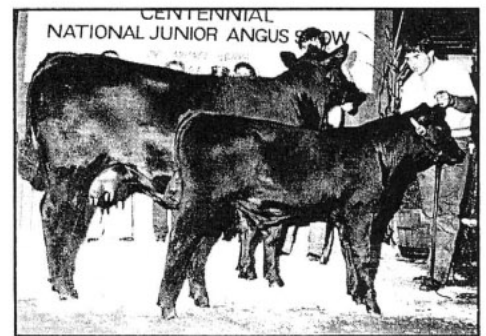

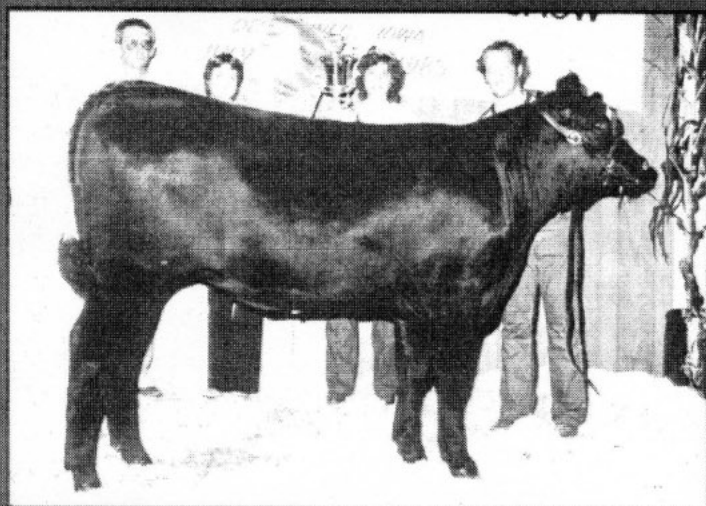
This year, after entering a record 926 animals, juniors from 30 states gathered in Des Moines to lead out 546 head. Participants, their families and other spectators braved temperatures over the 100-degree mark to take in four days of activities—the 47 classes of owned heifers and bred-and-owned heifers, bulls and cow-calf pairs were only a part of the Centennial Junior Angus Show.

That part, though, brought young breeders from every corner of the nation. And for those that came away with top honors, the trip was worth every mile and effort. Competition was tough all the way through, but final choices of judge Jim Hough, Ardmore, Ala., seemed popular.

Rod Kendall, Pottlatch, Idaho, was at the halter of Kendall Kovergirl, grand champion heifer in the owned division. Rod's family and friends represented the Northwest with tremendous enthusiasm, cheering the April 1982 Thomas Big Shot daughter on from her junior division title to the number one spot among 362 entries.

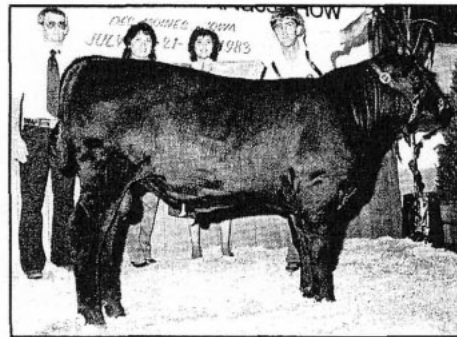

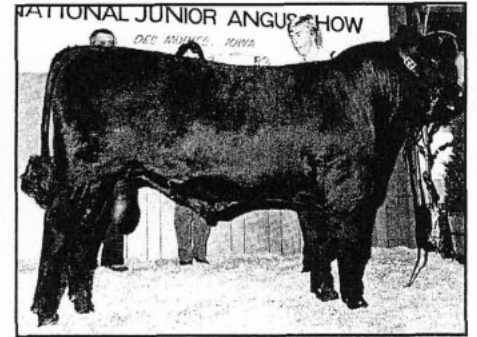

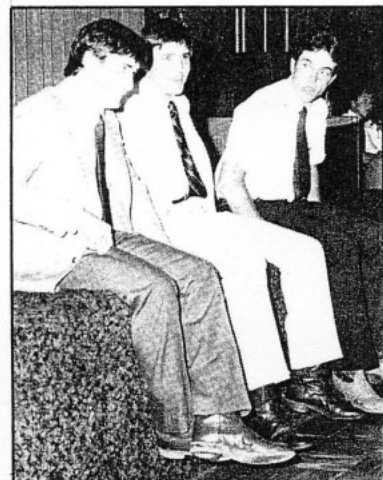

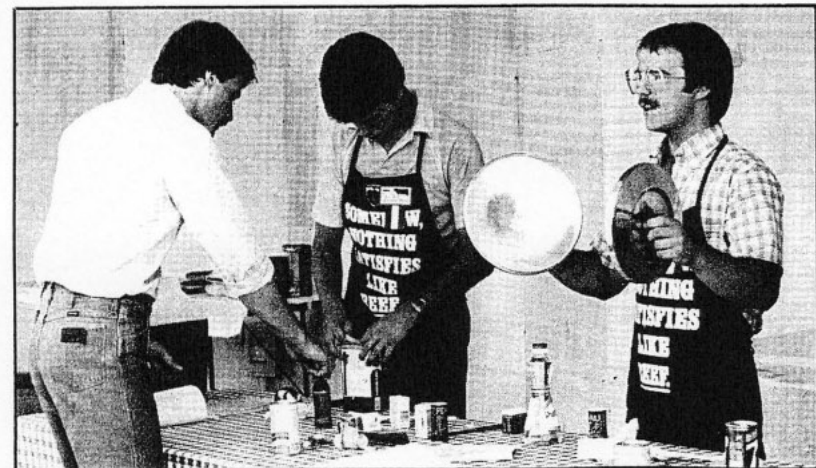
