Lyle Haring DeWitt, Iowa



Lyle joined the American Angus Assn. staff as regional manager in 1953. He organized the lowa Junior Angus Assn. and helped organize the Missouri Junior Assn. Since then, both groups have been two of the largest and most active associations in the nation."



Ed Stout (deceased) Booneville, Mo.

"Ed Stout was responsible for making the junior association idea a reality. With the help of Lyle Haring, he organized the first junior association in Missouri. Ed was a fieldman for the

Missouri Angus Assn. and worked diligently to get his junior association off the ground. His hard work has continued to pay off, for many junior members in Missouri take advantage of the opportunities the junior Angus involvement offers. Robert Hicks (deceased) Midway, Ky.

"In the past 18 years, hundreds of young Angus breeders have competed in the National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest.

The man responsible for the initial organization of the National Showmanship Contest was Robert Hicks. A well-known Angus breeder. Bob taught Animal Husbandry courses at the University of Kentucky for many years. He coached the livestock judging teams and was in charge of the University's beef cattle operations. Bob also served on the board of directors of the American Angus Assn. During his term on the board, he suggested the concept of the showmanship contest. From his idea, the first National Showmanship Contest was held in Lexington, Ky., in 1967. Unfortunately, Bob did not live to see his innovative idea become a reality."

Frank Richards (deceased) Macon, Mo.

"Frank Richards initiated the beginnings of many of those youth programs when he developed the Junior

Frank was the executive secretary of the Association from 1946 until 1963. As he planned for the future of his organization, he knew that junior breeders and junior activities could be an important part of future success. He developed the position of Junior Activities director during his tenure. Through his administration, junior members across the nation have benefitted from the many programs and activities which that department makes possible."



Percy and Margaret Upton Madison, Neb.

"For the past 30 years, the young Angus breeders of Nebraska have experienced the positive effects of two very special leaders. Percy and Margaret Upton have unfailingly planned and executed programs and activities for Nebraska juniors since 1952.

Nebraskans quote the Uptons as often saying, 'Combined efforts make for worthwhile accomplishments.' In 1959, the Uptons combined their own efforts and accomplished organizing the young breeders of their state into the Nebraska Junior Angus Assn. The group was the third in the nation to organize. The next year saw the organization and presentation of the first junior Angus field day, again with Percy and Margaret Upton at the drawing table. Many junior shows, programs and activities followed in the coming year."
