

National Junior Recognition Program

Gold Award Winners

he National Junior Recognition Program provides an opportunity for young Angus breeders to become nationally recognized for their achievements and involvement as junior Angus members.

The program, based on activities over a member's entire career, offers three levels of recognition: bronze, silver and gold. To qualify for an award, points must be earned in four categories—association activities, competition activities, performance testing, and production and merchandising of Angus.

Any junior, regular or life member of the American

Angus Assn. who is 20 or younger is eligible to apply for the bronze or silver levels, and silver award winners may apply for a gold award only during their last year as a junior member.

These gold award recipients have excelled as junior officers and leaders. In addition, they have been very involved in all facets of junior Angus activities. Hopefully, the examples that these juniors have set will spur younger members to continue their involvement and strive for excellence in the Angus breed.



J. WESLEY EDMUNDS JR. Clover, S.C.

"I hope to continue my interest in the Angus industry as I have gained much experience and realize that with initiative and strength, I can achieve the goals I set for my life."

The son of Evelyn Edmunds, Wesley is the only boy in a family of six children. He is currently a sophomore at Clemson University and has also doubled the last two years as a comanager with his mother in their cattle and turkey operations.

LINDA KROEKER Hutchinson, Kan.


"I realize that it is the responsibility of every Angus breeder to strive to keep our breed number one, and that will be my main goal."
