Steer numbers double from '85 as juniors parade their best

Junior Angus breeders from 29 states and Canada brought 532 head to the state fairgrounds in Springfield, II., to vie for that top honor of "Grand Champion" at the 18th National Junior Angus Show held July 14-18.

Rex Harl, Hastings, Ne., placed a total of 438 breeding cattle which included bred-and-owned heifers, owned heifers (heifers owned but not bred by the exhibitor), bred-and-owned bulls and cow-calf pairs. Dr. John Edwards, Fort Collins, Co., had the prestigious honor of placing the largest registered

Angus steer show yet, 94 head.

Taking home the purple rosette in the bred-and-owned heifer division was JC Manhattan Annie 536, a May, 1985 daughter of Cobble Pond New Yorker. Also named the interediate champ, this heifer is owned by Jason Carrico, 15, Redfield, Ia.

Dorla Cates, 20, Mount Pulaski, II., led her junior winner, DC Winnies First Lady, to the reserve grand champion bred-and-owned heifer spot. She is an April, 1985 QLC Winchester daughter.

A young exhibitor, **Neenah Hill,** 10, from Forest, Va., was presented the grand champion banner in the "owned" heifer division with her entry, **North-cote New World.** This September, 1985 daughter of Cobble Pond New Yorker earlier was awarded the champion title.

The intermediate champion, Prospect Miss Morrison 66T, got the nod from judge Harl and moved into the reserve grand champion "owned" heifer position. Owned by Jane Geaves, 15, Arva, Ontario, Canada, this heifer is a May, 1985 daughter of Ken Caryl

Overdrive 304H.

Grand champion bred-and-owned bull honors went to Dr. Omega, by Cliff Simmons, 21, Williamston, Mi. This January, 1985 Dr Spock son earlier claimed the title of junior champion.

Tricia Russell, 15, Bedford, la., exhibited the reserve junior and reserve grand champion bred-and-owned bull, J.R.. He is a March, 1985 son of R&J Dallas 752.

In the cow-calf division, Nobleland Belle 123 and her March bull calf by Viking 975 GDAR were named the champions. The pair was shown by Sharon Secrest, 16, Caldwell, Oh.

Kenley Conner, 21, Buffalo, Ky., led Jilt Lovana OB 835 and her Janary Cobble Pond New Yorker bull calf to the reserve champion cow-calf spot.

Ty Krebs, 9, Gordon, Ne., went home a happy exhibitor as his entry, Mikey, was slapped the grand champion steer by judge Edwards. This March, 1985 son of Voltage HK 9063 weighed 1,180 pounds and had a weight-per-day-of-age of 2.35 pounds.

The reserve grand champion steer, JFP Heathcliff, was shown by Susan Patton, 17, Crawfordsville, In. Her entry weighed 1,120 pounds, had a weight-per-day-of-age of 2.47 pounds, and is an April, 1985 JFP Amazement son.

In the carcass show, Doug Rentz, 14, Coldwater, Oh., exhibited the grand champion. His March, 1985 Fairfield Hi Guy son weighed 1,245 pounds, had a weight-per-day-of-age of 2.55 pounds, a hot carcass weight of 810 pounds, graded Low Choice, and had a 2.2 Yield Grade.

An April, 1985 son of Premier Independence KN was named the reserve grand champion carcass. Shown by Darrell Bowman, 16, Waynesboro, Va., the steer weighed 1,205 pounds, had a weight-per-day-

of-age of 2.60 pounds, a hot carcass weight of 738 pounds, graded Average Choice, and had a 2.3 Yield Grade.

Amy Ostrom, Loganville, Ga., earned the Premier Breeder Award. It is presented to the breeder of the three highest-placing animals in individual classes of the show.

Members of the Virginia Junior Angus Assn. won first place honors and \$100 in the group-of-five competition, featuring entries put together by members of a junior Angus association. The Illinois juniors finished second and won \$75; they were followed by the Indiana Junior Angus Assn. which placed third and received \$50; and fourth place and \$25 went to the **Pennsylvania** juniors.

First place along with \$125 in the best display by a state junior Angus association exhibiting 16 head and over went to the Kentucky Junior Angus Assn. The Indiana Junior Angus **Assn.** was second and received \$75, and the Michigan juniors finished in third and was presented \$50.

The **Tennessee Junior Angus** Assn. won the 15 head and under category for the best display. They also won a total of \$75 in prize money. Second place and \$50 went to the Louisiana Junior Angus Assn., and taking third and winning \$25 was the group of juniors from South Carolina.






JR stands as the reserve grand champion bredand-owned bull for Tricia Russell, Bedford, Ia. This bull was the reserve junior champion.










Members of the Virginia Junior Angus Assn. put together the first place group of five head at the National Show and received \$100 in prize money.





Type Conference Capsule Conclusions:

- 1. Don't regress in frame size while adding other selection criteria.
- 2. Future selection rank may be: carcass, structure, fertility, calving ease, milking ability, and frame, last.
- 3. Calving ease is the most frequently asked question of an A.l. service.
- 4. The most important function frame size serves is predicting optimal slaughter weight, the end point of young cattle.
- 5. A post-legged animal does not have to be very post-legged to be unsound.
- 6. You can advance milking ability very little by culling for it. Use the sire summary.
- 7. Milk and muscle are antagonistic: there's no free load.
- 8. Angus popularity is due to its high reproductive rate under a broad range of environmental conditions.
- 9. Consistency is something we simply don't have in the beef industry today with more and more breeds and more and more genetics and differences.


