



Record-Setting 923 Entries Compete for Honors at **National Junior Angus Show**

unior Angus breeders from coast to coast traveled to Louisville, Ky., July 18-22 to compete in the 1995 National Junior Angus Show. The 27th annual event, held at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center, recorded 923 entries, making it the world's largest single-breed beef cattle event ever held.

Jim Hough, Dresden, Ohio, evaluated the 537 owned heifer entries, the show's largest division, while Galen Fink, Manhattan, Kan., judged the 200bred-and-ownedheifers,60bred-and-owned bulls and 45 cow-calf pairs that were paraded. Gordon Jones, Bowling Green, Ky., picked the champions from the 52 steer entries shown. There were also 29 entries in the carcass steer di-

Host state junior Angus breeder Wesley Womack, Pembroke, Ky., walked away with top honors in the owned heifer show. Deer Creek Rita 15D, a January '94 daughter of TC Stockman, was Womack's grand champion entry. She was also the early junior champion.

Following Womack into the winner's circle was Ted Bourne Jr., Donalds, S.C. His reserve grand champion owned female was named Waldeck EF Forever Lady 9407. The January '94 reserve early junior champion entry is sired by Waldeck Sky Traveler.

Ty Krebs, Gordon, Neb., topped the bred-

and-owned heifer entries, taking the grand champion bred-and-owned female award withhis February '94 daughter of Leachman Right Time. WK Stella 4379 was the early junior champion win-

Reservegrandchampionbred-and-ownedfemale honors went to Julie Dameron, Lexington III. Her entry, Dameron Errolline 412, is a January '94 daughter of VDAR Rito 263, and was also the reserve early junior champion.

In the bred-and-owned bull competition, Andrew Donnell, Jackson, Tenn., was awarded grand champion laurels on DB Blackman 412. The February '94 son of Leachman Prompter was also the winner in the junior division.

Sy Olson, Hereford, Texas, took the reserve grand champion bred-and-owned bull title on OCC Doc Holiday, a March '94 son of Marriott of WR BAR 8055. He was also the reserve junior

Phil Leitnaker, Pleasantville, Ohio, topped the 45 cow-calf pairs that were shown with Champion Hill Blackbird 33, a January '93 daughter of Minerts Fortune 2000. She was teamed up with her March 1995 heifer calf sired by Century Touchstone 131.

The reserve grand champion cow-calf entry was exhibited by Matthew Hotz, Neola, Iowa, O'Neill's Royal Lady 10, a February '93 daughter of O'Neill's Renovator, and her May '95 heifer calf sired by O'Neill's Quality Lad were his winning


Jeff Dalbey, Burlington Junction, Mo., took grand champion steer laurels with BA Top Hat, an April '94 son of BA Stetson 202. Dalbey's champion weighed 1,158 pounds and had a 2.56 weight per day of age.

Reserve grand champion steer honors went to Jason Johnson, Durand, III. JAF Gump JRW J411 is the name of his winner. He is a May '94 son of Hoff Hi Flyer SC 7134, and weighed 1,206 pounds with a 2.79-pound weight per day of age.

Julia Crenshaw-Smith, Manhattan, Kan., had the grand champion in the carcass steer contest. Herentry had a live weight of 1,266 pounds, and a carcass weight of 727 pounds. The carcass had a fat thickness of .32 inches and a ribeye area of 13.1 square inches. The steer graded Choice with a Yield Grade 2.17.

The reserve grand champion carcass steer was entered by Šam Lawson, Nicholasville, Ky. His entry weighed 1,112 pounds live, with a carcass weight of 696 pounds. The carcass had a fat thickness of .32 inches, a ribeye area of 13.6 square inches, and graded Choice with a Yield Grade 1.89

Bremer Earns Title at 29th National Angus Showmanship Contest

R aelynn Bremer, Blakesburg, Iowa, took home the coveted title of "Top Showman" from the 1995 National Junior Angus Showmanship Contest held in Louisville, Ky. Bremer, 17, topped the 49contestants to win the prestigious competition held July 21-22 in conjunction with the 27th National Junior Angus Show

Along with the "Top Showman" title, Bremer received \$350 from the Hamilton James Memorial Fund.

Michael Roddey, Travelers Rest, S.C., won second place honors and received \$250.

The third place showman was Jamie Smith of Lebanon, Tenn., who received \$175. Mollie Holtkamp, Salem, Iowa, earned fourth place honors and \$125. Joel Foshea, Cedar Hill, Texas, won fifth place and \$100.

The cash prizes awarded to the top five showmanship winners were on behalf of the Hamilton James Memorial Fund, established in the memory of Angus enthusiast and auctioneer Ham James. The American Angus Auxiliary presented each of the top five finalists a silver Revere bowl.

The three judges for the event were: Jerry Carrico, Redfield, Iowa; Bruce McDonald, Fayetteville, Tenn., and Paul St. Blanc, Lena, Miss.

These judges evaluated the contestants on skill in handling their animal, their ability of follow instructions, use of equipment, courtesy, sportsmanship and general appearance. The contestants did not show their own animals. Instead, they drew at random for an animals show.

The top five showmen were picked from 15 finalists who were selected after five rounds of preliminary competition. The 15 finalists then returned the following day to compete for the "Top Showman" honor.

The 49 contestants were selected to represent their respective states. Each state is limited to twoshowmen to compete in the national contest.

SHISHKABOB FRUIT BUNS

Wisconsin Junior Angus Association

first place recipe, junior division

3-4 lbs sirloin steakboneless and cut 11/4 inch thick 2 medium onions 2 large green peppers 1 medium cantaloupe melon 1 medium honeydew melon 6mediumpeaches,not-quite-ripe 8 large crusty buns, i.e.: Kaiser rolls or French rolls

Original Marinade:

1/4 C balsamic vinegar (may use wine vinegar) 2/3 C olive oil salt and pepper 2 Tbs. fresh herbs (chives and oregano; may use 1 Tbs. dried herbs)

Slice sirloin into 1/4 inch by 2 1/2 inch slices. Cut peppers and onions into 1 inchby2inchsections. Combine marinade ingredients and marinate meat forabout1hour before cooking.

Place meat onto kabob skewers, alternating 2 to 3 pieces with peppers and onions. Keep meat and veggies centered on the skewers.

Cut melons and peaches into chunks, about 1 1/2 inch cubes or pieces. Place onto separate skewers in alternating order.

Grill meat and veggies over medium coals, turning to desired doneness (about 3-5 minutes per side). Add fruit skewers to the grill just before meat is done and turn, about 1 minute per side. Remove meat and veggies from skewers and place into rolls, add leftover marinade if desired. Cut fruit into slices and place in sandwich with meat. Serve extra fruit on the side.

Simmer all ingredients and pour over meat in baking dish or plastic bag. Marinate at least 3 hours Turn several times. Grill steaks over hot coals, brushing with marinade, until medium rare. Remove to carving board, and let stand 15 minutes. Cut into serving pieces.
