Judges comments: "This photo is timeless. The use of black & white film enhances the character of the young farm boy. It's also a natural shot—the photographer caught the moment. You can almost feel the excitement and 'is this work or play? attitude' of the boy sitting on the hay stack."

Judges comments: "Warm lighting and fine-hair focus add quality to this photo. The photographer really brought out the details of the animal and showed the toll of a hot, sweltering mid-summer day."

Title: Kansas City '96



1st — Amy Stotler, Apopka, Fla.


Title: It's a Dirty Job, But Somebody Has to Do It

Title: Heart to Heart

Judges comments: "This photo catches and communicates that special bond and curiosity between a breeder and his cattle. It has good color, contrast and detail. Framed just right, too."



3rd — Amy Stotler, Apopka, Fla.

Judges comments: "Catching the moment is what this photo is all about. Good scouting and a knack for being prepared gave this photographer the judges' nod."
