Angus Association (NJAA). The meeting was held in conjunction with the 1999 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) at the Tulsa State Fairgrounds.

New officers were announced during the awards ceremony held Sunday, July 11.

Serving as chairman of the 10,000-member organization for the coming year is Melissa Pickrell, Paris, Ky. Julie Dameron, Lexington, Ill., is vice chairman.

Lindsey Trosper, Hamilton, Mo., is communications director, and Garrett Pohlman, Norfolk, Neb., is Foundation director.
